Following her visit to the club, and at my request, Ayushi writes: *Ed.*

"Of the several cherished experiences that Soroptimism has gifted me with, the most notable is being selected as a SIGBI delegate to attend CSW63. Attending the CSW63 taught me new lessons in each step of the way. To be in an institution with 9000 other women and men, who are all there with a single motive...to make this world a better place for women...made me feel powerful. But it enraged me at the same time.

"Year after year, an assembly as such has to be convened to fight for the rights of women....to assess the progress made by the Member States in giving effect to their rights...to evaluate what further steps are required to be taken to ensure that women's rights are not bypassed. Never in the history of mankind were any such assemblies or actions required to be taken for men's rights...why? The answer lies in the fact that their rights have always been considered inherent...but why don't women's rights receive the same acknowledgment, even in this day and age? The CSW is a grim reminder of the several future sessions that require to be convened in the long road to the emancipation of women.

"The CSW this year considered social

protection systems, access to public services and sustainable infrastructure for gender equality, as its priority theme. The paucity of time forced me to be selective about the events I attended, out of a huge list of events I wanted to attend. The two events which I found most exciting were 'The Townhall Meeting of the Secretary General with CSOs', and 'Take the HOT SEAT: A High-Level Intergenerational Dialogue'.

"The several parallel events I had the chance to attend left a lasting impact on me. In these sessions, discussions were also held, inter alia, about the rights of indigenous women, older women, and women with disabilities.

"I had my own chance to contribute as a panellist in one of the sessions: 'What is True Justice: Intersection of Education and Entrepreneurship'. As the title suggests, the session focused on how encouraging women to become entrepreneurs make them independent and economically self-sufficient. I discussed the importance of bringing more women into the STEM sector, and highlighted the Indian perspective. You can read more about it here:

"Attending CSW63 left me feeling driven and hungry to take action. There is a lot one can do to make a difference, even in individual capacity. Start with small steps. You do not need to be a part of an organisation to fight against the discriminations women face. 'Our future will become the past of other women, and girls, you are those other women!'

Programme Action:

Lindsey encouraged us all to take part in service either by attending meetings organised by the UN, Scottish Older People's Assembly or Scottish Women's Convention.

Or to help out by knitting *tiddlemuffs*. These are simple garter stitch muffs but are highly decorated with buttons, ribbons etc. Lindsey has the pattern. These are given to dementia patients and Alison has established that they would be appreciated by the geriatric wards of the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh.

Or in taking part in *Sewing for Hope* a project to help girls and women in Kaagera cope with period poverty. Contact Sew4Hope@tumainiscotland.org.uk

Or take part in *lendwithcare* to help and empower women in developing countries. This consists of giving various sums of money to be used by the women. It does not produce any monetary interest and money may be withdrawn should the need arise, but it does help with the microfinancing schemes.

Or help sorting at *Kids Love Clothes.* A board was circulated to try to make a team for the autumn. Incidentally the *Pub Quiz* raised £7,500.

Lindsey thanked all who had donated items for Cranston Street. Caroline is willing to sell DVDs. These should be brought to any meeting.

Membership:

Anna reported that she had raised the question of mature student fees (as requested) at the Region meeting. Melanie took note of his.

Anna also handed the treasurer £52 to be sent to the Meru Project as a result of our publicity stand at RBS.
