After being inspired by hearing Margaret Jarman speaking on the difference a water well can make to families in Cambodia, Club members have raised £150 from donations and joined other Midland Arden Clubs in sponsoring their own water well, Number 523, through the UK Friends of Cambodian Child's Dream Organisation (CCDO). It has been built in Promkot Village, about 22 kms east of Siem Reap and is shared by five families with a total of 38 people using it. The Club is keen to continue their support and will be exploring whether more wells can be sponsored in partnership with Kidderminster Town.

In response to the condemnation of the shooting of Malala Yousafzai at the Belfast Conference, action taken by members of Kidderminster Club included signing the petition that Mr Gordon Brown, acting as United Nations Special Envoy for Global Education, presented to the Pakistan Government. Also, two members, Stephanie Ainsley and Liz Broadfield joined other Midlands Soroptimists in the silent candlelight vigil held outside the Pakistan Consulate in Birmingham on 10 November.

As Christmas approached, members continued their support for the Food Bank in December helping with the collection at Tesco Supermarket together with the sorting and distribution of the 1500 kilos of food so generously donated. Help was also given at the Birchen Coppice Primary School Christmas Fayre with the bottle and chocolate tombolas being very popular.

Members spent an afternoon helping with the Christmas decorations at the Fred Bennett Centre in Kidderminster in support of Kidderminster's Friends of the Elderly. It was a fun afternoon and enjoyed by all and the Club wishes to continue to support the valuable work at the Centre.

Once again the Club joined in the fun at the Bewdley Christmas Lights Festival and this year provided entertainment with 'Roll a Penny' and 'Pick up Sticks' games. The proceeds, together with the monies raised at our Christmas Supper Raffle, will be given to the Women's Refuge.

A special treat was in store at our Christmas Supper when 40 members and friends were entertained by the Soroptimist Players with a specially commissioned version of Dick Whittington, by Jen Eglinton, Artistic Director of the Rose Theatre.



SOLIHULL

Solihull will welcome Anna Saunders, Development grades required for entry into teacher education Manager at the Open University to their next business meeting, to provide an update on the President's charity this year. Chris Spriggs chose 'Lamps for Malawi' to be the focus for fundraising, and money from a number of events has already gone to the OU.

The Teacher Education in Sub-Saharan Africa (TESSA) programme was awarded the prestigious Queen's Anniversary Prize in 2009 for world-class excellence in developing the skills of hundreds of thousands of primary teachers in Africa. The Open University is the only British university which focuses on delivering learning through capacity building inside Africa, employing its expertise in teaching and research to enhance the educational infrastructures of developing nations.

The Saltire Scholarship Scheme was set up by the Scottish Government to provide pathways for rural women into teaching whilst allowing them to remain in their community. 500 Scholarships were to be awarded. These women may have completed secondary education but failed to achieve the

programmes.

Malawi was chosen for the project as there are large classes in Malawi primary schools but there are few women teachers. There is also a high drop out rate for females in rural primary education and those that stay are generally low-achievers. This provides low numbers of suitably qualified female applicants to formal teacher training courses.

The Soroptimist part of the project was to provide wind-up lamps, sourced in Malawi, to enable these young women to study at home. The fun part was the decision to send a personal letter with each lamp, to provide a link from Solihull to the individual student. We even had a 'sweat shop' at one of our social events, where three members produced 18 letters between them! It has been wonderful to piggy-back on the partnership between the Scottish Government and the Open University, and Anna is delighted with our efforts. We hope to see some pictures of the 'ladies with the lamps' when she attends the meeting.

STOURBRIDGE

Stourbridge club members have been busy fund raising for their charities. This year they are supporting Acorn Hospice, which helps children with life limiting conditions and their families, the hospice is in Walsall. The other main charity is Farmers Overseas Action Group (FOAG).

There was an evening of entertainment by a local band Bev Pegg then in December Andrew Lound did a dramatic presentation of the Midlands connection to the Titanic.

Hanbury Hill Baptist Church in Stourbridge has though the Soroptimists donated toys to the Dudley refuges for a number of years and they once again exceed their previous years donation and the Soroptimists delivered this to the refuges.

Members of SI Stourbridge joined a local Girl Guides group to teach them to knit and help them produce bonnets for premature babies. The event proved to be very successful and the guides have now gone away to knit more. This was part of our development work to join up with one of Soroptimists partner organisation and to help spread the word of Soroptimist International.

On Saturday the 12th January President Su one of the 65'ers Presidents ran a coffee morning

from her home for Target TB. Members of SI Kidderminster joined members of SI Stourbridge for the morning and they all enjoyed cakes and biscuits to accompany the teas and coffees. Members ran a raffle and together with donations made £129 for Target TB. Everyone who attended took away a raffle prize and the draw was made for the guess the stitches in the Royal Wedding party that was won by Ann Middleton from SI Stourbridge.
