Quotes from that speech that may make you think:

- '...Across the world, too many women and girls spend too many hours on household responsibilities—typically more than double the time spent by men and boys... In many cases this unequal division of labour is at the expense of women's and girls' learning, of paid work, sports, or engagement in civic or community leadership...'.
 - "...We want to construct a different world of work for women. As they grow up, girls must be exposed to a broad range of careers, and encouraged to make choices that lead beyond the traditional service and care options to jobs in industry, art, public service, modern agriculture and science...".
- '...We have to start change at home and in the earliest days of school, so that there are no places in a child's environment where they learn that girls must be less, have less, and dream smaller than boys...'.
- '...It will take determined steps to protect young girls from harmful cultural practices like early marriage, and from all forms of violence...'.
 - "... Women and girls must be ready to be part of the digital revolution...".
- '...We must see a significant shift in girls all over the world taking STEM subjects, ...Currently just 25 per cent of the digital industries' workforce are women...'.

'...The stakes are high...'

- '...It also requires a determined focus on removing the discrimination women face on multiple and intersecting fronts over and above their gender: sexual orientation, disability, older age, and race...'.
- '...Incentives will be needed to recruit and retain female workers;adoption of the <u>Women's Empowerment</u>

 <u>Principles</u>, and direct representation at decision-making levels.
 - "...Accompanying this, important changes in the provision of benefits for new fathers are needed..."
 - '...In this complexity there are simple, big changes that must be made: for men to parent, for women to participate and for girls to be free to grow up equal to boys.

SI Cirencester and District celebrate International Women's Day



To celebrate *International Day of the Woman*, members of SI Cirencester were promoting Soroptimism and recruiting members at an International Women's Day event held at the Sundial Theatre, entitled '*Wine*, *Women and Song'*! Every stall holder and/or key performers were women or greatly influenced by women.

Research Project

Local people; local action

The aims of the project were to identify where the needs are greatest for women and girls in our local community.

There were three objectives

- 1. To find out what the issues were.
- 2. To discover what existing services were in place to support these.
- 3. Conclude where SI Cirencester & District should put their efforts in order to have maximum impact.

From desk research and interviews conducted by community leaders the following was surmised.

- 15,000 children in Gloucestershire are living in poverty
- Higher than average problem with self-harm & suicide in young girls.
- An ageing population that causes isolation & loneliness
- Loneliness is not just restricted to older people, there has been a national increase in ages between 45-54

A lot of great organisations exist already to help support the above, but the focus tends to be on the crisis and not the prevention. The Club already works hard with schools to support local girls via the Literacy awards and Nature quiz. Fundraising and promotion of services by the Club, such as Gloucestershire Rape and Sexual Abuse Centre (GRASAC http://www.glosrasac.org), Cirencester Housing for Young People (CHYP http://www.chypthecharity.org.uk), the Churn Project (http://www.churnproject.org.uk), Cirencester Eating

Disorders (http://www.chypthecharity.org.uk), the Churn Project (http://www.churnproject.org.uk), Cirencester Fating Disorders (http://cirencester.gov.uk/cirencester-eating-disorders-self-help-group/) and many more also fit within this.

In terms of identifying where the gaps may be the project team have decided to approach the young Carers and see if any help is needed, also to talk about plans for putting together a social companionship group for those aged 50 and over. Proposals will be drawn up and brought to the Club for members to decide how we should proceed.

Fairtrade: The question was raised about whether the Club could, once again, do more to support retailers in Cirencester to think about their supply chain and buy, where possible, Fair-Trade products? Nikki

Medieval Manuscripts - Corinium Museum Cirencester

SI Cirencester is proud to be one of the Sponsors that has enabled the return of four Medieval Manuscripts to Cirencester for the first time in nearly 500 years.



In order to understand the significance of the return to Cirencester of some of the Manuscripts that were written in the Abbey around the 12/13 century we need to look a little further back in time.

The Venerable Bede, although he never personally visited Cirencester, or Corinium as it was then known, was well versed in the local history of the area and wrote that when the Mercians defeated the Gervises at the battle of Cirencester in 628 the former took charge over the Severn Valley. This area with its rivers and gentle landscape was an ideal place for monks to build an Abbey and sustain its presence due to the surroundings.

Now on temporary display at the Corinium Museum until 21 May, with free entry, are four of the Manuscripts originally housed in the Abbey library from 1117 until its demise in 1539 when they were sent to Jesus College Oxford and the Bodleian library where they are still housed.

Perhaps what is especially important concerning these Manuscripts are the beautiful examples of book binding which is clearly to be seen in the display and are among only a handful of examples of Romanesque bindings.

This is a unique opportunity, not to be missed, to view these Manuscripts before they are returned to the Oxford libraries.
