New Year Greetings from the President Team

Even if the year is moving on at speed - good wishes for 2021.

As we begin the centenary year of Soroptimist International in a situation of uncertainty, let's hope that we can celebrate and look back to the commitment and vision of our founders with appreciation and thanks. They must have set out with optimism and enthusiasm, and as we look forward, we must do the same.

The UN General Assembly has declared 2021 as the International Year of Peace and Trust – in the hope of mobilising international efforts to promote peace and trust among nations.

This obviously is in complete accord with the objects of Soroptimism. And something that the world is currently badly in need of. We may be acutely aware of the difficulties we are facing here at present, but we can't forget our sister soroptimists in even more troubled parts of the world.

In many communities it is through the patient work of women that harmony is achieved and often that is because of access to education - also one of our aims.

The legacy of political upheaval and its consequences, such as occupation, was brought home to me several years ago when I was working in Eastern Europe. One student told me that she had not been able to look anyone in the eye until, during the course of her studies, she slowly learned to trust her fellow students. Previous experience had taught her that virtually no-one could be trusted. Anyone could be an informer. You didn't even look directly at the person at the till.

For various reasons, that feeling will hold true in some places today. And there is no sense of security in such a situation. The signing of the treaty banning nuclear weapons may reassure some, but we still need to campaign for peace.

There is a proverb along the lines that 'she who has health has hope' so with the arrival of vaccinations, let's hope we can soon meet each other again, even in very small groups, and carry on the work of our forebears.

SIE Business Meeting held on 13th January 2021 on Zoom

Present: Anna (in the Chair) + Patricia, Edith, Nikki, Pat, Myint Su, Clephane, Gari, Dorothy, Marjory, Christine, Lindsey, Kathleen, Alison. Anna welcomed everyone to our first Business Meeting of 2021 and in our Centenary year.

3S Candidate: Presentation from Fionn from Queensferry High School requesting support for her Project Trust assignment in Nepal starting in August 2021 for 12 months. Fionn shared with us the skills she hoped to make use of during her assignment – Music (Piano, Singing, Accordion), Drama (annually produces a local play) and her experience volunteering with a local Youth Group and Research Group (Lost Soldiers in WW2). She selected Project Trust because she has realised how important teachers are to developing children and inspiring them to love learning and Project Trust ensure that all their volunteers are sent to locations where there is no real provision for teaching locally. Her project will involve her and another Project Trust assignee teaching primary and secondary age group in a rural Nepalese community where she will stay with a local family. Fionn is hoping she will be able to make learning more engaging by using expressive art techniques, help work against inequality by educating the boys and the girls of their potential and how to overcome obstacles, teach English and leadership and inspire them to enjoy learning to lead them to a brighter future. She hopes that on her return she will be able to share her experience of the Nepalese culture and build long term relationships between Scotland and the Nepalese village. Fionn is 1/3 of the way toward her fundraising target of £6950 and because of the pandemic she has had to find innovative ways of raising funds which she says in itself has helped her develop new skills!

Myint Su offered to help her make a connection with some old friends that live in Kathmandu that she may want to pick up with when she is there.

ACTION: all members agreed to support Fionn's application for 3S funding and Marjory will progress the application. Anna gave her permission for her 'virtual' sign off.

No. 63 AGM: Myint Su, Nikki and Edith will all be attending the AGM on 23/1/21. As Treasurer Myint Su will be able to cast any votes on behalf of the club. The club were asked to indicate their decision re the following items –

Minutes of last AGM – Accepted and no matters arising

Any questions to be raised re the Accounts? – no points to be raised. Nikki summarized the position from her perspective that whilst there had been a loss in the year to September 2020 it was not surprising in view of the impact of the pandemic on the hospitality industry. The company asset position looks reasonable and the Directors continue to consider the business as a ‘going concern’ and the Auditors endorsed this in their review. Nikki will ask about occupancy levels in 2020.

Vote on appointment of Auditors Kreston Reeves – Agreed

Vote on nominations for Board Directors – 2 Directors remain in situ as appointed last year for 2 years: 2 Directors seek re-election and there are 5 new nominees. Board can have between 5 and 9 Directors. All Nominees accepted.

Action to be taken for any business raised at the meeting or between now and the meeting- it was agreed that Myint Su, Nikki and Edith would discuss any business and the club gave authority to Myint Su to vote on their behalf.

Programme Action:Lindsey – Cranston Street – thankyou to all members who donated gifts, toiletries and hand sanitizer. All were handed over on 12/12/20 and Cranston Street were extremely grateful. Lindsey had arranged for an article and picture to appear in the Evening News. We also received an e’Christmas Card from the staff and ladies.

Kids Love Clothes- minimal activity although Lindsey had hoped a few of us may be able to assist at the end of the month.

Smalls for All - Region project. Also impacted by COVID - lots of donations but unable to get to store to sort and dispatch.

Marie Curie - annual ‘Daffodil’ collection cancelled but website is accepting any donations that people are able to make

On -Going Programme Action activity whilst we ‘stay at home’ email sent to all members with a suggestion for a ‘stayathome’ project. .Between us to identify 100 women that are living, have ‘made a difference’ in their lifetime and are connected to Scotland. We would require you to write a paragraph or two on the person you have identified and send to Lindsey – you can use information that’s in the Public domain. Names so far: Ann Budge, Chair of Heart of Midlothian Football Club: Sharon White first woman CEO of John Lewis: Christina McAnea the new General Secretary of Unison and first female appointment: a choir mistress awarded the BEM in the New Years Honours list. No final decision yet on what we will do with this information (it could be influenced by how many we get) but suggestion was made that we would at least publish them on our SIE Centenary webpage.

Tree Planting: Lindsey – We have confirmed to our contact in Edinburgh City Council our commitment to plant an Orchard and Silver Birch Trees at the primary school in Niddrie. An invoice will be presented to Myint Su for payment idc. It is unlikely that planting will happen this spring in view of COVID and school closures however it does give us time to consider preparation of a short leaflet to explain why we are doing this, the benefit to the environment and a bit about Soroptimists.

NOTE: A decision was made (and supported by all members present) at the end of the Speaker meeting on 9/12/20 for us to fully finance the planting of the trees as per the estimate provided by Edinburgh City Council - £689 with the funds coming from the club Legacy Fund

Behind the scenes of the Treasurer

PURPOSE AND ROLE : To administer and oversee the financial affairs of the Club and carry out the duties of an Officer, working to promote the Vision and Mission of Soroptimist International.

KEY TASKS :

1. Work out annual membership subs : (meeting room rental+ SIGBI capitation fees + SSR dues + Regalia insurance + SIGBI website maintenance + United Nations membership divided by number of paying members, rounded up to the nearest £10)
2. March/April - issue requests for payment of subscriptions to paying members.
3. Issue membership cards to members for current year.
4. Maintain Royal Bank of Scotland current account and list of signatories; amend where necessary (Nationwide Building Society account was wound up in 2020). Keep log of all income and outgoings.
5. Book meeting room dates (currently at Scottish Youth Hostel)
6. Pay for - Bills
Annual returns
Hall rental
Regalia insurance (usually together with the SSR dues invoice)
United Nations membership and SIGBI website maintenance (usually in January).
Various donations as they crop up (e.g. speakers' charities, one-off donations)
7. Order or pay for membership and other related badges.
8. Bank donations and other cheques and raffle and Hippo monies periodically.

9. End of March – prepare financial statement (and handover bank statements, receipts, cheque and pay-in book) for examiner and to present to AGM.

10. Disburse all fundraising monies as instructed by the club; send cheques for donations such as to 3S Fund, Diamond Education Grant, International President's Appeal).

[Note :I took over as Treasurer from Ishbel in April 2018, just after SIE's 90th birthday. I have to say that I was very glad that I wasn't treasurer the year before as Ishbel had to deal with quite complicated accounts that year, with donations and refunds due to the shortcomings of the venue where the celebrations were held. I was grateful to her that she stayed on to help deal with the spilling over of transactions from the previous year on to the new financial year beginning April 2018. I never had much to do with figures, but one lives and learns as they say!
