UKRAINE

A powerful, practical and poignant update from Ukraine – Nataliya, a fellow Soroptimist from SI Dnipro corresponding with our member Winifred.

Dear Winifred

I want to believe that you are healthy and are in a pre-holiday mood. Soon you have the greatest holiday of Christmas. I was lucky to be on the eve of this holiday in Germany and Scotland. It's great!

I'm fine. Now I am with my mother, but tomorrow I will go to the Dnieper, because I will have classes from Tuesday to Friday, and here the lights are turned off very often. In Dnipro, where I live, they also turn off, but, as a rule, I have time to conduct classes. The students who live in the area suffer greatly without electricity. They contact me by phone if there is a connection, but there is no electricity. But, you know, I have never heard any words of discontent from anyone.

The main products in the store are, only the price of them is growing rapidly. Many drugs are not available. Prices have gone up on everything. There are lonely people; it is very difficult for them.

But we understand that in a military situation it cannot be otherwise, it can be even worse. There was no electricity, water, communications in my apartment for 4 days, but there was gas. Well!

Olga received help for members of our club. Therefore, for all the members of the club who are in the Dnieper, they bought warm underwear, sleeping bags, power packs. This is a great help for us. Natalya (this is our president now) received help to pay for medicines for club members.

Money was also allocated for refugees. For some of them, we purchased power banks and paid for the purchase of medicines and products.

My daughter-in-law and granddaughter returned from Germany. Now it is difficult for them, because everything in their apartment is connected to electricity. The daughter-in-law seizes every moment - she cooks food at night, they dress warmly. They are great, because they find a way out.

This is all the information about me, about our club. The letter had to be written for several days, because the electricity was often turned off.

I congratulate you and our friends on the upcoming holidays, Merry Christmas!.

P.S.I will attach a photo - this is the homework of my student, which she sent me. She wrote it by candlelight, because there is no light.

What resilience, determination and hope are reflected in Nataliya's words. Regrettably we cannot reproduce the photo Nataliya refers to (technical issues!) but it showed a page of handwritten notes, next to a lit candle embossed with the words 'eniov the little things'. Aileen welcomed everyone and especially Dishi, SIGBI Director of Membership.

Dishi spoke about the new plans for the SIGBI Board and the changes that would take place. She will be working closely with Lindsay Director of Programme and Anne Director of PR and Marketing. Women today have very different lives, and the traditional soroptimist club model is not for them. Dishi has been working with women's business networks, which meet in the mornings, do not involve selling and above all are very friendly. They have speakers and do fundraising but there is no record of this - whereas we link our data to the UN. Linked In is another community of women that she has tapped into.

Feedback from these women about the SIGBI website has been mostly negative. It is elitist, out of touch, white middle class and dull. They don't want mission statements they want to know eg how much money we have sent to Ukraine.

Dishi described Facebook as an "echo chamber". Posts are circulated round other soroptimists and do not spread out with. There is a need to spread our

message out to non-soroptimists, there needs to be a clear message as to what Soroptimism is. "We Stand Up for Women". We need to give examples of our work and we need to appeal to people's emotions so that they want to be part of the story. Dishi described getting to know other women through other networks as a "slow burn", they get to know you, they trust you, they then want to know more about Soroptimism. This approach does work but we need to take everyone with us. Invite other women to meetings to hear the speaker, **not** business.

We must cut back our processes, eg keep minimal working notes. We must market Soroptimism as a brand not as clubs or regions. There should be no negative messages. We need different membership styles of linked associate membership. membership (especially as a way of introducing women into the organisation), virtual clubs etc. Take away boundaries! Have speakers that make us feel good about ourselves.

The Board will be working on simplifying processes, the Hub launches in January, and this will be a positive development. Our website must capture readers and we must compete with the business networks. Allowing monthly payments of fees is crucial - £6 or £7 a month seems much more acceptable and reasonable. There will be new leaflets, banners, and shared information.

We must come back to the objects of Soroptimism – we are a volunteering organisation, and our projects must have an impact on women. It is not enough to raise money – we need to say what the money will do for women. Instead of "we raised £500 at a coffee morning" we say instead "£500 was raised which will pay for 10 starter packs for women"

We must also remember we are a charity – this will appeal to businesses and their corporate social responsibility. Our brand shows we have integrity and humanity – we are about empowering women and girls.

Dishi then answered a variety of questions including working with young men, collaborating with other women's organisation e.g., around International Women's Day, schools, and campus clubs.

Everyone found Dishi to be inspiring and it was encouraging to hear of the changes that will be taking place. Dishi advised that Board members had committed to be directly contactable by members. She reminded us also of the need to treat everyone first of all with kindness.

Dishi was thanked for joining the meeting and sharing her vision for the future.
