It is difficult to know where to begin, in trying to give, in a limited time, a sense of Mum's long and busy life.

Do you start with the WW2 child evacuee?

The extraordinary academic achievements?

The decision, remarkable at that time, to go to Africa to teach English?

Or to later return to Africa, married, with a 2-year-old and another child to be born there?

Leading the communal singing of "Is this the way to Amarillo" to welcome in the New Year?

The accomplished stand-up comedy routine at her 90th birthday celebration?

The proud winner of Falkirk's worst poet award, her submission in the style of McGonagall? The creative writer, so generous of her time, in mentoring those just beginning? And a published writer and poet in her own right?

I have decided therefore to start with what might be called her second life, when she sold up and left Dunblane and started afresh in Edinburgh.



Now, I remember the first time I brought Sarah to Edinburgh to meet mum, which went well I'm pleased to say and after the first night, she confided to me, 'she goes out more than we do!'

And it was true.

It was impossible to keep up with Mum; one night was the Folk Club, another night was one of the many writer's circles, there was the Soroptimists, the Walter Scott society, the Muriel Spark society, not to mention visits to the theatre and cinema. And occasionally having a few friends rounds for a bite. Helping run the committee for Beresford Court. And not forgetting, of course, family visits, and long blethers on the phone, which I already miss more than I can say.

During the Festival, of course, she more or less left home. I'd be trying to phone her and would eventually contact my sister, panic-stricken, saying something had happened to

Mum; but she had only been out all day and every day, going to whatever show took her fancy.

All this activity might have seemed in someone else a bit sad, even hinting at a desperation to make new friends. But with Mum it was because she had so many friends, and a real and rewarding interest in people. She could talk to, and take an interest in, anyone and everyone that she met.

Her wide experience of travel meant that she could easily relate to people from different backgrounds and cultures, although it did once try her forbearance when, having hired a local decorator one summer to redecorate our house in Dunblane, she had not performed 'due diligence' on this tradesman's working practices. It proved apparent that he could only work to the works of, at full volume, ad nauseam, Mr Sydney Devine.

Enough, as she later said, to try the patience of a saint.

My mother was not of course a saint; I must be honest in this tribute.

She had of course her imperfections; for example, her ardent conviction that the Hungarian forint was legal tender in Marks and Spencer on Princes St.

Or indeed that when trying out a new recipe, family members were used as guinea pigs to see if it was suitable for 'proper guests.'

An emergency visit to the optician over a sudden and dramatic deterioration in her eyesight was cut short when the optician.....cleaned her glasses.

She was wearing these same spectacles, presumably, while walking to church one morning, and noticing a car slowing down

alongside her. Thinking it a kindly fellow worshipper offering her a lift, she hopped into the car.....and was promptly asked to leave by the driver, a complete stranger.

Finally – and I have a lot of stories to choose from – some years ago, I went with Mum to a meeting of the Edinburgh Poetry Society.

Seated in the very back row, I felt unaccountably proud when Mum was called to the rostrum up front to read, for the amusement of all, her new comic poem, 'I found myself a Toy Boy'.

And sure enough, her offering had the assembled poets laughing away. And then the assembled poets started glancing back at Mum's companion for the night, the handsome young man who'd arrived with her.....indeed. Having subjected Mum to all this (unfair) criticism, I'd like to finish by mentioning some of the things that were said about Mum in all the many, and very kind cards and messages that we have received since she died:

'wise, non-judgmental and kind'

'a friend and an inspiration'

'so much fun'

'kind, loving and hugely entertaining'

'her sense of enjoyment of life and friends'

I should say that even now, I still automatically reach for the phone to discuss with her the latest political foolishness, or whatever book I'm reading, or a particularly good obituary!

But then I remember, to my despair, that she's not there.

Finally I'll finish with one last thought: on the day that Mum died, Mary and I spent a long time on the phone, to tell friends and family about the sad news. And during those calls,

and I speak for Mary as well, one phrase was
heard repeatedly;

'She lit up the room when she came in'

I can think of no more fitting epitaph.

I'd like to finish with one of Mum's poems

"Cleaning the Boots"

Remember when I cleaned your climbing
boots

You always dressed them properly next day
yourself.

Even at oiling I was no use


Nor of shifting the cake of grit and clay

but when the boots felt leaden and
gentlest slopes precipitous,
when close hill shifted out of reach
could therapeutic walks and easy strolls

Kathleen joined Soroptimist International in 1992. She was in the SI Dunblane club when the tragedy happened. Every letter of condolence that was sent to Dunblane was answered.

A sunshine Tapestry was commissioned and donated to a General Practitioner surgery. The ladies who stitched the Tapestry were involved with the Altar at the Great Hall at Stirling Castle.

Kathleen transferred to SI Leith. One of the club social events was held in Holy Cross Church Hall. In 2002 after SI Leith disbanded 12 members transferred to SI Edinburgh

Kathleen was President of SI Edinburgh 2024-2025. I was President the following year. I had never been a top table person before, but Kathleen mentored me throughout the year.

Even if she was doing something else the evening of a club meeting she came along

and made sure I was OK. Then she would phone me later at home and asked "had I got my Gin and Tonic"?

On other occasions she would always come up with the right words at the right time. I am very grateful to Kathleen for getting me through the year.

Kathleen came to our club Christmas social last year, and proudly said she was dining out on her royalties from her latest book. She was also pleased to have received an honour from the Sir Walter Scott Society.

Kathleen had a wonderful sense of humour which sustained her throughout her life. Anna,

'an example of how to embrace ageing with grace'

He also described her as a sociable extrovert who lived life to the full.

Certainly her humour and self deprecation / ability to laugh at herself have stuck in my mind. `Clephane

New member Elena was welcomed .

She was introduced via UN House where she is an intern and has been involved in a number of cohorts including topics on Nuclear Disarmament and on Human Rights and has done research on gender based violence . She has also been a Youth Representative at Council of Europe.

She is taking a degree in International Relations at Edinburgh University and is hoping this year to continue her Masters in Edinburgh.

Elena's has family connections to Norway and Scotland

Although a new member, with Pat's support, Elena has been selected to represent SIGBI at the CSW(UN Council on the Status Of Women) in New York in March.

Liz will be Elena's mentor.

Nikki hoped that SI Edinburgh and SI generally, can support Elena in her research on Violence Against Women and Girls, specifically in the social media space.

Minutes of meeting on 12th November 2025

Matters arising :

SIE Speaker meeting November 2025: Scottish Government consultation on Women's Health and NHS Lothian Action Plan – five Scotland South Clubs were represented on line. Christmas Social was most successful - thanks to Anna

Dorothy stated that SIGBI invoice for £40.00 was payment for the website.

Thanks to Gari for frequently sharing information on UN House which helps to raise club awareness.

Programme Action (PA)

Liz explained that as well as clubs there are PA groups for Scotland North and South, who have joint initiatives.

Liz is our club rep at Scotland South PA meetings which are on a 6 weekly basis with a rotating chair and minute taker.

SIGBI ran a UK wide survey of safety at railways, not surprisingly larger stations were felt to be safer. This is an ongoing project. When the survey information is collated it will be shared with the relevant Rail authorities.

The SIGBI Conference in 2025 had a 'speed dating' session where clubs promoted their projects and ideas were shared. Scotland came out well regarding how we collaborate in activities.

Scotland South Region have written to the Scottish Government for clarity re gender eg impact assessments - the reply indicated that they are included as part of Equality Impact Assessments and there is no plan to do otherwise.

The PA group will follow up with the Scottish Government to ask how the issues are being addressed in new policy development.

SIGBI UK received a similar bland response from Westminster.

The SIGBI UK website is being updated - development was being coordinated by the previous PR person, now by Ruth Healey.

Liz mentioned that the region PA group had received a presentation from one member on the Supreme Court ruling regarding definitions of gender in relation to the Equality Act 2010. There were strong differences of opinion prompting someone to leave the meeting

Hopefully when we are discussing this matter in January and March we will stay level headed.

At the next speaker meeting Anna will give an overview on transgender issues based on her experience of working in the gender clinic. By March there may be more clarity from the EHRC.

Survivor Information Space project - a small group from both Scotland North and South Region chaired by Liz gave feedback to the police re their survey of survivors of domestic abuse. ACTION Liz to circulate comments.

The next meeting will be on Monday 19th January with reps from the Scottish Government and the Police task force.

The group is becoming a campaigning/advocacy group rather than a practical group.

Dorothy Bain Lord Advocate has commissioned a review on the experiences of survivors of domestic abuse in the Criminal Justice system - is it being done in tandem with Police Scotland and the Taskforce?

Pat commented that the UK Government has picked up on this issue thanks to Soroptimist pressure and plan to do a similar review. Jess Phillips MP mentioned the influence of Soroptimists.

At the last Scotland South Region meeting Liz was thanked for the progress on the project due to her focus and enthusiasm.

The next Scotland South PA meeting is on Thursday 19th February at 19 30. Sue will attend on our behalf.

Lindsey mentioned ACTION projects to be considered for the PA 2026 plan:-

Smalls for All - collection of new briefs and gently used bras

Big beach Count - a survey is kept of litter picked and compared with previous years
Kids Love Clothes - dates will be arranged for later in spring when volunteers sort or iron donated clothes

Marie Curie Daffodil Appeal - Anna, Edith, Elaine, Lindsey and Sue will collect donations on Friday 27th February at Morrisons in the Gyle Shopping Centre. Elena will register independently and collect on another date.

Equally Safe Partnership on Violence against women and girls (VAWG) - City of Edinburgh Council (CEC) co-ordinated a multiagency programme for the 16 days of activism on this subject. Liz attended a number of online events.

Judith attended a North Lanarkshire event about a Bristol teenager who was subjected to sexual assault and human trafficking plus an event on the attitudes of men who buy sex. ACTION Liz and Judith to forward resources and any recordings.

Sue attended the ESP subgroup on women's safety in public places - a survey had been sent out to 13 to 18 year olds asking about their awareness of the 'Respect Her Place' campaign and for ideas of where to display information eg social media. Sue sent comments re survey length. ACTION Liz will also comment. Agreed that we will follow up our conversation with Angela V about awareness in city bars of the Ask for Angela campaign.

Bayswater Road, London, U



Over many years one of the key challenges has been to repair and restore this beautiful, listed building to ensure its future going forward. Now is the time that significant work is required.

Your Board of Directors have been working to assess the work needed to ensure that the structure of the building is well maintained and safe for guests.

In early July there was more flooding after a severe weather event one Sunday evening. With the hard work of the General Manager and Staff, the damage was limited.

However it took several days and over £10,000 of work to enable Guests to remain in the Hotel. Ceilings came down, carpets, bed side tables, bedding, towels - were all damaged and in most cases not salvageable. All those rooms affected were made good and there was little business interruption.

The Board were unanimous that we needed to secure funding to be able to 'fix' areas of importance and as such have worked on a programme of works that are required.

We have launched a fund raising campaign via <https://gofund.me/3181cf9c3>.

To keep this beautiful listed building in good shape – and to ensure it remains a viable hotel for Soroptimists and the public – we need to raise at least £100,000 now. As a listed building, Number 63 needs significant investment to remain a safe, comfortable and attractive place for our guests.

Number 63 (Soroptimist) Limited – Number 63 Hotel has been a welcoming home on Bayswater Road, London, for over 76 years. Originally created for Soroptimists, we now also welcome friends plus national and international guests – helping us sustain this unique and historic property.
