Final Address

International President Ann, Honoured Guests and Soroptimist Friends

Education is the great engine of personal development and it is through education that the daughter of a peasant can become a doctor, that the son of a mineworker can become the head of a mine, that the child of farm workers can become the President of a great nation.'

What better encouragement could we have?

There is a great African Proverb: 'If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together'. Some of those who have supported me are not in this room but have done so by tolerating my frequent absences from meetings and tasks unrelated to Soroptimism. One supporter, who is very closely related to me, has threatened divorce if I even mention his name – but I am allowed to say that he is secretly very proud that Sheila put one of his photos on the front cover of an issue of the magazine this year!

My club friends gave me a magnet at the start of the year which says: 'Friends are like walls. Sometimes you need to lean on them, and sometimes you just need to know they are there.' You have been a fantastic wall!

I will remember two things above all from this wonderful experience: the faces of women around the world, all dedicated to our cause, and - the voices of children sitting under a tree singing of their joy at being at school. The faces of friends and the voices of children are the <u>best</u> gift in a year of gifts and I thank you for it. Being President <u>does</u> take time and hard work but what you get in return is immeasurably greater.
