President Dorothy writes:

As the recently appointed President I see myself as an ambassador for the club members. I look forward to working and sharing ideas with the members in order to maintain high

ethical standards of Soroptimism. I feel we all have a story to tell about our life experiences and sharing information would be extremely helpful for our members and potential new members.

We have a strong and vibrant executive team and club members and the need to maximize our membership is deemed very important. I am proud to see that new members have joined. I hope this will continue.

I believe in a democratic approach to our activities, through consultations, debates and discussions. Each and every club member has a voice and something to offer. My vision for the future of the club is for it to go from strength to strength. If I am asked can we really achieve this, my answer would be yes we can.

Finally, the charity I will be supporting is Sickle Cell Anaemia, a life threatening inherited blood disorder that is affecting families mainly from minority communities. However, research has shown that Sickle Cell has crossed

racial lines and that the stereotype of this condition only affecting certain groups is a myth. Sickle cell is now occurring in the white community. I set up the Sickle Cell support group in 2004 for Individuals and families suffering with Sickle Cell. An educational programme for Health care professionals, and other groups was delivered to raise awareness and understanding. This was deemed necessary due to the lack of knowledge of those caring for patients and in particular young children. I am hoping to get as much support as possible because of the underfunding from the NHS. As far as I am concerned, we all have individual needs and the right to life and good health care.

STOP THE TRAFFIK

On Mon 6th March, Sue Woods, Anne Grimes and Elaine Stump attended the tenth annual conference of "Together against Trafficking" – STOP THE TRAFFIK at Oasis, Media City, Manchester. Member Annette Maudsley was helping at the event.

We heard from inspiring speakers in this very dynamic and fast moving conference, who want to make a difference FAST. There were also contributions from key partners, in Nigeria and Romania, working at many different levels tackling cultural customs and differences which are becoming increasingly unacceptable in our Global Economy and Community.

We attended 3 different workshops: Policing, Community and Education respectively. There are now multiple agencies working together in Manchester in the same office, amassing data and information from many sources. This networking between agencies is vital for success against the traffickers. We heard how traffickers use different methods of entrapment, including social media like Facebook, how the general public must look again at what seems ordinary, e.g. Nail bars, car washes etc. and not take situations just at face value. Modern day slavery is going on right now in

your area!

There were several important messages we learnt over the course of the evening:

- That we have to work together
- We cannot stop what we cannot see
- Sense it. Spot it. Stop it.

And one more thing – we enjoyed a tasty meal prepared by the women supported by Saheli, the Confidential Domestic Abuse Support

Service in Manchester – absolutely delicious!



Forward March!

many people who learnt about Soroptimism that day!


