".....Thank you most sincerely for the recent gift - It s always gratefully received and your faith and support is truly appreciated.

In the attached photograph - six of the women are coming back for second eye surgery. There were nine women in the group who came one eye 'blind' (cataract) and four with 'almost mature'. More by chance than plan they have the opportunity to have their second eye operated on. Our first priority is double-eye blind cataract getting one eye cleared. However the monsoon closed a major track at the end of a forest area and so we stopped at the nearest junction where this group came from. So as not to waste time and fuel they came back for final checks and will have surgery at the end of next week.



I read that even England has had the backlash of the terrible cyclone on the US east coast. Maybe climate change is real!!! We are both well and have our daughter, Honey, with her baby girl staying with us. New sound in house! Regards *Eliazar*"

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

## WOMEN'S WORDS OF MANCHESTER

Nearly three years ago Soroptimist Manchester was asked to be a partner in a project -Women's Words of Manchester. Susan, Sue and I were on the steering committee from the start and more recently Elaine joined as our expert on uploading and organising the blogs. The other partners were the Pankhurst Trust, WordPlay and Manchester City Council.

Women's Words was the idea of CIIr Josie Teubler. She wanted women to write and share

their experiences of living, working and growing up in Manchester. Initially a book was planned but the project changed along the way following advice from the Arts Council who helped fund the project. The call went out last year to all women from any background to write their words. Workshops were arranged in libraries around the city to help those who needed assistance with their writing. Other workshops were also arranged to help the vulnerable and marginalised: those experiencing domestic violence and abuse, refugees, asylum seekers and the homeless. They produced rosettes and aprons showing their words and spoiled forms. Everything will be on display in the Central Library till the end of April. All the entries will be archived in the library later in the year.

Our Suffragette tea party (the celebration at the end of the first part of Women's Words) was held on the 5<sup>th</sup> February, the eve of the 100 years since the first women were granted the vote. It was a great night! Councillor Eddy Newman, Lord Mayor of Manchester and Andy Burnham, Mayor of Greater Manchester, attended. Many of the women who sent in entries and attended the workshops were also there.





Our new re-imagined Suffragette magazine was on sale. Dr Helen Pankhurst, the great granddaughter of Emmeline Pankhurst, spoke. Three entrants, whose pieces were included in the Suffragette, read out their contributions. It was wonderful to hear their words.

It's been amazing meeting so many interesting, dynamic women through the process. I have been out of my comfort zone but I've learned so much, blogged for the first time and taken part in some of the workshops. It's also been a great way to spread the word about Manchester Soroptimists and the work we do to help women and girls. *President Rose*




#### **NEWS FROM CHILDREN ON THE EDGE**

This is one of the charities we have supported and they write:-

....In mid January we completed the humanitarian component of our response to the Rohingya Refugee Crisis. Thanks to the generous support of many donors, we were able to provide food parcels, solar lights, clean water and latrines for over 5,000 refugee families. We also doubled up our established 45 schools in the Kutupalong camp as safe spaces for around 2,250 newly-arrived Rohingya children.

Throughout February we have been hearing feedback from these families about the quality of this provision, and how it is making a difference. We're pleased to be able to share this with you as we prepare our longer term response, establishing 150 new classrooms in the camps.
