Extinction Rebellion (XR) Climate Crisis Rally

From 21st – 24th April Extinction Rebellion (XR) and 200 other organisations held a huge Climate Crisis rally outside the Houses of Parliament. "The Big One" was barely covered on the news, even though tens of thousands of people from Greenpeace, Friends of the Earth, Trade Unions, Just Stop Oil, faith groups and lots of community groups. There were tiny tots and seniors and everyone in between, with a very strong presence of medics and scientists.

In a departure from their more Suffragette inspired actions, XR organised the event in conjunction with the police. There were no arrests and there were plenty of cheers for the marathon racers.

We can't be sure what our Emmeline would think of this, though we do know the views of her great-grand-daughter.

In 1919 Lady Astor became the first woman to take a seat in Parliament.


Unfortunately the data reveals only small progress in many areas of the 5 areas they look at - employment, education, safety, culture and participation. COVID did not help Women's progress.

On the first day we headed to a Thai restaurant called The Giggling Squid and enjoyed a light lunch before walking around the centre of Harrogate, heading to some of the Parks and Gardens which were already showing the signs of Spring. The weather was dry and sunny and when wrapped up it felt nice and warm. We managed to get to Bettys for a nice cup of tea by late afternoon and stayed until they closed. The experience took 3 hours as you follow the ritual of heating, cooling and cleansing, moving through the varying heat chambers including the Tepidarium (warm), the Calidarium (hot) and the Laconium (hottest). Then you can complete the experience by cooling down in the Plunge Pool (where we were told to please try to refrain from screaming when you get in, it was that cold!!), and also visiting the Steam Room or relaxing in the Frigidarium.

We decided that one night wasn't enough and so spoke to the hotel

and managed to stay an extra night in the same room. This meant we could partake of more beautiful food as we dined at The Ivy, the whole experience was superb. The service was second to none and the food was a delight. I had steak tartare and Lemon Sole which were both perfect.

Sophie Kennedy is walking 26 miles in aid of Alzheimer's Society.....

"On the 21st October 2022 my Mother-in-law suddenly and very unexpectedly passed away. This was very quick for her and so fortunately there was very little suffering, but it was a great shock to all her family and friends and most importantly her beloved husband, my Father-in-law, Ivan.

Ivan was diagnosed 7 years ago with Alzheimer's disease and his wife was his carer. This meant that overnight he not only lost his wife, but also his house and car, as he is not able to live on his own, and he also moved overnight from Derby, where he had always lived, to live with us in Manchester.



I'm pleased to say that he has settled in well and he seems content, with a great sense of humour and cheekiness. We have outside help coming in to help with personal aspects of his care and we hope that we can maintain this living arrangement for as long as possible.

Having first hand knowledge of how Alzheimer's affects the minds of 1 in every 14 people over 65 in the UK; I have decided to embark on a 26 mile sponsored walk to help raise much needed funds to be used for research into the cause of and hopefully cures for the disease.



The 'African Women's Health Forum' Donation.

Liz Aniteye was part of the African Women's Health Forum and when they were wound up a few years ago they still had some funds left for distribution (£668.97) Liz and the other Trustees would like the club to distribute the funds. Liz has confirmed that there are no formal restrictions on this request. However, they would prefer local women's groups rather than international groups and have expressed a wish for it to go to charities dealing with the outcome of Domestic Abuse.

Liz carried out the research and due diligence with the help of the Programme Action Committee and decided that it should be divided between 3 organisations, one in Trafford, one in Salford & one in Manchester.



TDAS Trafford Domestic Abuse Service were delighted to receive the cheque. Kirsty explained that they were hoping to restart the 'Craft & Coffee' style groups for their service users to get to know and talk to each other. These Women's groups were very popular before COVID but they hadn't had the funds to bring them back. TDAS are in the process of moving to new premises and now, thanks to these funds from the African Women's Forum, the Women's 'Craft & Coffee' groups can be reinstated.

Lydia Chan, founder of The River Manchester was delighted to receive the donation from the African Women's Forum. Lydia said "It will be used to support our advocacy services for vulnerable women who have fled domestic abuse who have little financial resources" Donna later gave more detail about 'Living Life to the Full' courses, CBT based, to help with low mood and give strategies when people are having life struggles. Also 'Mindfulness Crafts' groups. Both are support groups for talking and sharing.

Research continues for a suitable Salford based organisation.

New Hope - Pavithra's Story

Bio Data Pavithra in Eliazar's words:

A family divided – 'Cause' - Man died of AIDS. It's not unusual for us, sadly. The small town where the family lived became aware that the husband in the story was HIV+. Everyone assumed they must be infected. They were socially ostracized. The mother stood at the end of the 2 hours a day water supply tap. Government rationing system. His death came soon after the social ostracization but it meant that his wife and two children were evicted from the rented 2 room 'low cost no bathroom house. The story in short – they ended up at New Hope. We



then, by clinical testing realized mother and daughter are HIV+ but the eldest boy negative.



After a few years when the uncle of the boy came to know the boy is not positive, took him home. It was a hard decision for mother and sister but they saw the long term. Later as Pavithra's mother came under treatment she, like a network of such women, found a job as an 'apartment cleaner' in the city. Pavithra stayed with us. Her mother saved and rented a small room near the city and so for short holiday Pavithra goes to stay with her. Her brother unbeknown to the uncle visits them in school holidays. One might say 'life'.

Pavithra and her brother – who through the family situation saw very little of each other growing up. Except when by 'chance' her brother would simply, quietly come to visit.

Our joy is that Pavithra has passed 10th class and is in 4th year high school. She is now on her way to completing an ANM – it stands for an 'old' designation - Auxiliary Nursing Midwife. It's a basic Nursing course to work in Hospitals and First Aids Clinics. She was admitted after a long discussion due to her being HIV+ but on medications and showing 'no viral load'. The District Medical Officer supported her application because they are desperate to have 'nurses' working in situations where the patients are HIV+.

It's ironical that the LONG TERM benefit for New Hope is that Pavithra will return to work as one of our Nurses in OUR Clinic.

In the last 2 years this has really been Pavithra. She went to



art and skipped singing as it took time to practice. Her whole spare time was to 'learn difficult English words. English in written form is not easy for Indians as our main mother tongues are straight phonetic ka kaa – da daa **NO Know or Knot.**

Walking back and forth from house to office I can see into the First Aid Room Clinic and many times I saw her there with the Nurse in charge.

Like almost all the young people they enjoyed throughout their education a 'second Saturday of the month Arts and Crafts time. A social break together. But Pavithra skipped it in the last 2 years

I can humbly say it took a lot of convincing for us to get her enrolled in this Nursing Aid course as her medical certificate shows HIV+ But with their understanding that she is on mediation and will work with us when qualified they basically had to agree. More so now that we are a recognized ART medication for HIV+ registered persons. *Eliazar T Rose*
