A Quilting Journey

30 years ago I was inspired by the quilts at the American Museum, Bath and attended a patchwork and quilting evening class. I produced two quilts and was full of enthusiasm. Then other aspects of life took over, I met my husband Paul and had two children, and I had no time to sew.

Roll on 2020 and the world changed again. COVID had a big impact of course, although I was still at work daily in the hospital and lockdowns made me feel a creative outlet would help keep me mentally strong. I was also panning ahead for my retirement 2 years later, and having "an empty nest", and so decided to start patchwork again. I found only being able to buy fabric online strange at first but successfully navigated this and renewed some sewing skills to produce a sampler quilt. Reassured that in the USA sending your quilt for longarm quilting was common, I started searching for a helpful UK expert. I discovered that (of course) my quilt was actually too large for some frames so I eventually sent it off to North Yorkshire!

Encouraged by the outcome, and how much I had enjoyed the process, I knew I would be doing more once retired. I embarked on another quilt in 2022 for my daughter, followed by a 70th birthday quilt for a dear friend, they both pored over books with me to choose colours and layout. Somewhere along the line I became completely hooked!









As I retired one of my gifts from the hospital was a book about the quilt designer Kaffe Fassett and some of his fabric and since then my library of books and stash of fabric keeps growing. He designs some very vibrant fabric and quilts and so it is not surprising that they have featured in my sewing.

So now my son has a quilt and we have two for our Lake District lodge. I belong to two quilting groups already (because we know I can't do anything half-heartedly) and have made new friends and of

course I am learning all the time. The longarm quilter, another Fiona, in Yorkshire has quilted all my large quilts so far brilliantly. In between I have made lots of cushions and zipped cosmetic bags, pin cushions and table runners for Christmas and birthday gifts.





In between the big quilts I can join in with projects in the quilt groups such as producing quilts for the Linus Project. This provides quilts as gifts for babies and children in hospital. Due to our work with Early Essentials I was able to offer them baby Linus quilts for some of their Moses baskets and have even made some baby quilts myself between bigger projects. As our Linus coordinator is moving I am now assisting in the Linus project which will continue the Soroptimist connection.

So what next?

Perhaps I can make a quilt for us to raffle as part of our centenary project.

Over 60,000 people joined Chris Packham, Steve Backshall, Dame Emma Thompson and Feargal Sharkey for a peaceful, legal march and rally. It was also promoted by Dame Judi Dench and even Jonathan Pie! We called on everyone to recognise and reverse the damage done to nature and a call to action to avert the climate crisis.

It's unusual to have so many groups that have not previously worked together. It was organised by the RSPB, The Wildlife Trusts, WWF, Friends of the Earth, WWT (wetland restoration), Woodland Trust, Rewilding Britain, National

Trust, Wildlife and Countryside Link, Plantlife and Extinction Rebellion. In all, participants from 350 charities, businesses and direct action groups took part. It was very colourful and many thought-provoking banners expressing the frustration at the state of our land, water and air and the hope that it might not be quite too late.


