

This international campaign against gender-based violence started in 1991 and is run annually from November 25th (International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women) to December 10th (International Human Rights Day). Many of our ongoing projects support women and girls who have suffered or at risk. During this year's 16 days we were delighted to be able to help Manchester Women's Aid, Contact Hostel, Early Essentials and WomenMatta. In addition, we planted a shrub in Didsbury Park – a small contribution to help combat climate change. According to the United Nations an estimated 80% of those adversely affected by climate change are women and girls. Sophie, our Vice President and Membership Officer, has put daily posts on Facebook. Orange is used to represent a bright future – one that is free of violence against women and girls.

......Pat, Hilary, Val and I were so excited.



Our planning for the 100th year of SI Manchester is now well under way. Meeting before the club meeting for an hour seems to be successful as a way to include any members who would like to be present. All are welcome and no doubt there will be roles for all of us in the events and projects we are planning.

Our threefold aims are

- to promote Soroptimism,
- to fundraise towards our £10,000 total by our 100th birthday
- and to celebrate in style our commitment to support women in children in Manchester and further afield.

Save the date for our 100th Charter Dinner in 2026 on Saturday 28th March as we have secured both a booking at the Novotel, Worsley and Helen Pankhurst as our special guest. I will be undertaking "an interview with Helen Pankhurst" on the night and we will be planning entertainment and considering how to make it a special occasion for us, members around the region and hopefully family or friends to join us.

In order to make it easy to see where we are up to in the planning, we will circulate a proposal document for each event. This will allow everyone to add in their thoughts and ideas or to offer their skills or enthusiasm to help either with aspects, or to volunteer as the liaison lead for the project. This should help us keep on track, consider budgets, and remain organised in a timely way. We need everyone to put their thinking caps on as we consider how to interest sponsors and keep up our fundraising so something for everyone to contribute to.

Exploring our archives will give us a chance to reflect on how Soroptimists have been active in the city over the last century and hopefully allow us to build some displays for our events and maybe for other venues to promote Soroptimism and attract new members.

Exciting events for 2025 including an afternoon tea with an accomplished speaker on historical jewelry; an African night of food and dancing and music (booked for 14th June); a circle dancing evening with Greek cuisine will hopefully allow us to meet our objectives above and to enjoy working and celebrating together.

All welcome to come along to centenary planning meetings at the earlier start of 6pm before club meetings or some ad hoc zooms. Do let me know what is important to you about our centenary plans.

Sharon's Camino de Santiago de Compostela, Spain

Next March Sharon is taking the Camino Inglés or "English Way" & has offered to walk the 115km for our Centenary Charity Fund

The "English Way" runs about 115km/71 miles (five days) to Santiago from Ferrol in northern Galicia. It owes its name to medieval pilgrims from Britain, Ireland and other northern locations, who would sail to ports like Ferrol then complete their journey to Santiago overland.

It combines stretches along picturesque *rías* (coastal inlets) with sections across green countryside and through the medieval towns Pontedeume and Betanzos. All historic pilgrimage routes lead to the city of <u>Santiago de Compostela</u>, <u>Spain</u>, home to one of Christendom's holiest sites: the tomb believed to hold the remains of St James the Apostle (called Santiago in Spanish) inside the city's <u>magnificent cathedral</u>.

Sharon is a keen photographer (remember the Charter Lunch photos?) so we'll be able to share the views if not the pain! All we have to do is find the sponsors!

National Memorial Arboretum, Alrewas, Staffordshire

It may have taken 21 years but I finally visited the Soroptimist International Memorial at the National Memorial Arboretum after not being able to attend when the area was dedicated in 2003.

I was President and in May (2003) I and several members braved a blustery day at the National Arboretum in Staffordshire to witness the dedication of the Soroptimist tree.

It has some growing to do but at least it will prompt visitors to ask 'who, or what, is a Soroptimist?'

Soroptimist International Great Britain and Ireland has had a plot at the National Memorial Arboretum since 2001.

Lynne Dunning was the Federation President at the time and wanted us to have a presence there as she felt it would contribute to us being recognised as an organisation that works for peaceful communities to advance the lives of women and girls.

In June 2020 SIGBI President Isobel announced that the target of £10,000 for a statue on our plot, had been achieved from


