We have sent this to both MP's who have responded back to us and are meeting Ben Everitt on 30 August.

Dame Ann Limb is organizing a conference called: **Report to Court: unseen journeys of victims of violence through the law enforcement agencies and criminal justice systems: a strategic conversation.** This will take place on Friday 24th November 2023, 10am-1pm at The Gateway and the list of invitees includes the Police, Law makers and support services.

The conference will hear the voices of 3 women who have experienced the Domestic Abuse Courts and will be presented with the Soroptimist report. This 2023 World Ribbon Day theme is #ChangetheStory. Culture change doesn't happen overnight, but we can all end violence against women and girls in our life time. White Ribbon UK are encouraging individuals and organisations to make daily choices and actions so that we can #ChangetheStory for women and girls to live their lives free from the fear of violence now and always.



The Facts:

- Nearly 1 in 4 girls in mixed sex schools have had experiences of unwanted sexual touching in school. (EVAW)
- 6 in 10 women have felt harassed in the gym by a man. (The Gym-timidation Report)
- 3 in 5 young women have experienced sexual harassment in the workplace. (Trade Unions Congress)
- 1.7 million women experienced domestic abuse in the year ending March 2022. (ONS)

The sad reality is, that the majority of violence against women is perpetrated by men. Whether that is a partner, ex-partner, colleague, or stranger.

White Ribbon recognises not all men are violent but All men can end violence against women and girls by challenging harmful attitudes and behaviours.

We are meeting with Milton Keynes City Council and Bletchley and Fenny Stratford Town Council in August to look at what our campaign can be this year to raise awareness within our community. One possible way will be at Xmas time in Newport Pagnell Church. They have a weekend around 10 Dec time where charities set up a Xmas tree to promote their causes. We are hopeful we have an opportunity to display a white xmas tree with orange hearts and postcards to promote Orange the World and White Ribbon campaigns. Watch this space for future updates.

Did you know: Climate disasters make girls more vulnerable to child marriage?



As if the devastation wrought by this year's Cyclone Freddy had not been enough, it also left Marry Harrison's parents with an awful decision to make. Having found themselves among nearly 700,000 people left homeless in Malawi by what was the longest-lived tropical cyclone on record, the family had no food or money.

As their desperation for food mounted, the Harrisons were forced to consider extreme measures – marrying off their 15-year-old daughter.

Milton Keynes Fawcett group have published their most recent report on gender representation on the council, following the 2023 elections.

Compared with the UK national average, the council compares favourably, but the report highlights differences between political parties, missed opportunities to select female candidates and most importantly the issue of attracting a more diverse range of candidates in order to be more representative of the borough's population. **Click** here to read this story.

The Family Court and Domestic abuse

This month, the DA Commissioner released a report highlighting ongoing concerns about the traumatizing experience of the Family Court for victims and survivors of domestic abuse. The report amplifies calls to centre the experiences of children as victims of domestic abuse to ensure that their voices are clearly heard during proceedings.
