Record of 100 Books Read for 100 years of SI Celebrations

SUMMARY

- 100 books read from March 2020 to September 2020
- 46% (?) by women authors
- Approx 46% of the books read were thrillers written by various crime writers.
- The most popular crime writer was James Patterson 9%, followed by our local writer, Ann Cleeves 4%, and Lee Child; another writer of local interest is L.J.Ross (No. 64).
- The rest of the list includes an interesting and diverse range of genre such as :
 - those based on the lives of women and girls some of which are heart rending and not easy to read e.g. Elene Ferrante No 4, India Millar No 46, Michaela McCollom No 51 and Elaine Roberts No 55.
 - historical novels eg Philippa Gregory No 97, Geraldine Brooks No 20 and E.W.Powell No 54
 - mammoth reads eg Twentieth Century Trilogies by Ken Follett Nos 57 and 65, Melvyn Bragg No 52
 - non-fictional eg Monty Don No 28, Tim Parks No 56, Richard Galliene and Robert Louis Stevenson No 10
 - humorous eg Adam Kay's secret hospital diaries Nos 77 and 79; Boris Johnson No 19, and even a Spanish comic book no 18
 - light-hearted summer reads and escapism eg Rosy Walsh No 74, Alice Ross Nos 60, 61, 62 and 69 as well as the popular and liked author Maeve Binchy No 89
 - real life stories eg Larry Levin No 7, Eliska Tanzer No 15, Guinevere Glasford No 32 and Nan Shepherd No 72
