Despite COVID restrictions, Nottingham club's PA work continues apace. In February the main activity has been in the categories of tree planting and support of the refuges. More of that later.



You will probably have seen the article by We R Here in which they praise the gardening work that has been done by Mary D at their premises. Well done, Mary!


Clare Co also has done valuable PA work recently, running free relaxation sessions for several women referred from SAFE who are experiencing difficult times during lock down.

Exec Report

• Future pattern of meetings There had been a really constructive and friendly club discussion about the two suggested patterns of meetings. Four members had given email feedback and twenty-seven took part in the online discussion. One member rarely comes on Zoom meetings because she is working with a screen all day. Another prefers to wait to return when we can meet face to face. Members appreciate the benefits of both face to face and Zoom for various purposes. The clear preference is for an alternating pattern throughout the year with one face to face and one online meeting per month but perhaps with a bias towards face to face where possible. It is very helpful that Executive is now clear about members' wishes so that when face to face meetings can resume, the programme can be planned on that basis.

• Planning for future Club Meetings and Events

1st March PA Evening with speaker Helen Everett, Region PAO, will be the speaker. Audrey will advertise this in the Newsletter

15th March Charter Anniversary Meeting. Format and arrangements were made. It was agreed to invite Margaret Emsley, Secretary of the Diamond Education Grant, to speak.

AGM –Sue W will manage the production of the Annual Report. She will need to have the content by 10th March. No nominations have been received. Margaret will advertise again in the Newsletter and mention at meetings. It was noted that it is unfortunate that two of the club's major posts, Treasurer and Secretary, happen to fall vacant in the same year with both post holders having done six years. The Treasurer post requires someone with specific skills. The Secretary needs to have a good knowledge of the organisation. The Communications Officer has already done two years more than the official maximum. The committee recognised that it has powers of co-option.

- **85**th **Anniversary Celebration in August.** The tea party has been re-booked for 8th August. The contract has been signed and a £50 fee paid for making the change
- **AGM Notice of meeting**. This was approved. It was noted that there are a lot of vacancies this year and the issue of ensuring continuity was raised. There had been some discussion about this at the December meeting but it will need to be discussed again.
- Programme Action (Report given at Exec.)

The tree planting at Green's Windmill will be at 1400 on 12th March. There will be a video of the event. Plaques will give the date. FarmEco plaques will say that the trees were planted for the SI Centenary. Lisa is still waiting for confirmation from Karslruhe of their agreement to the mutual planting of trees for our two clubs.

Audrey will contact the Lord Mayor about support for these activities. Lynda and Lisa have been investigating the idea of turning the Council House orange



for the 16 Days of Activism this Autumn and are now looking at extending the idea through Craftivism. For example, we could knit orange scarves for the 'Slab Square' lions and the Brain Clough Statue with labels to say why. The latter would all be removed afterwards and the 'watchwords' would be 'do not harm'. We might be able to involve other craft/women's groups, Councillors etc and make it a City initiative. This will be discussed with the club PAC and the incoming Lord Mayor will be contacted.

• Finance

Ann presented five documents: Report for period ending 31st January 2021, Report for first week of February 2021, Balance Sheet for 1st February 2020 to 31st January 2021; Receipts and Payments 1st February 2020 to 31st January 2021, Treasurer's Annual Report for 2020/21. She had altered the previous adjustment to the Toilet Twinning budget to ensure that it had £243 in it which is the exact cost of the last block. This project is now ended.

This was agreed by Executive. Members had donated £155 to replace the money used to respond to Emmanuel House's request for urgent funds for food.

Thirteen subscriptions for the 2021/22 year are part paid i.e. the monthly payments

• A woman who inspires me

What an interesting meeting that was. Many thanks to the participants. Three of them have kindly put keyboard to screen and written a short summary of what they said. I will include 2 of them in this Newsletter, and 2 the next (I'll will get round to writing mine!)



Barbara H wrote of Sandi Toksvig

"Sandi is a very funny & witty stand-up comedian, who cheers me up & always makes me laugh. You may have seen her as compère of the entertaining TV programme 'QI' of quite interesting facts.

She is bilingual, speaking Danish like her father, the original & first Danish TV broadcaster. A 1st class graduate from Girton College, Cambridge she has written many books & is very knowledgeable about women's history (herstory), making us visible. She makes great, detailed, quick & clever retorts to sexist pronouncements.

In 2019, she was made President of the Writers Guild.

She writes for children too & as one of the early out lesbians with a high public profile, is a great role model for young people. In 2015, she co-founded the Women's Equality Party as a political act.

She is married to Debbie, a psychotherapist & lives on a houseboat.

(I am married to Gail & live on a narrowboat.)

I admire her for all those positive reasons, lesbian solidarity & feminist sisterhood"

Margaret wrote of Charlene Smith

"Charlene is a South African journalist who was also an anti-apartheid campaigner. She spoke at the Federation Conference in Durban in 2001. "At that time HIV Aids was the scourge of Sub-Saharan Africa. 90% of infections were in that Region. 40% of annual deaths in South Africa were due to AIDs. Charlene was a lovely, tall blond lady who told us an horrendous story of how in 1999 she came home one night to her home in Johannesburg and found a man



in her bedroom who raped her and left her tied up while he went to rob her bank account. He was not caught for several days during which time he rang and threatened her. The focus of Charlene's story was that when she got free and went to the Police, she was not offered an AIDs test or anti-retroviral drugs. She wrote her first article about the experience within a week of the event and within less than two years she had written a book called 'Proud of Me'. She campaigned tirelessly and, as a result, rape courts, rape trauma units at Police Stations and automatic testing and ant-retroviral treatments for rape victims became standard. She helped design new WHO guidelines and most significantly, she

helped others to speak out about their experience of violence. She was inspiring because of her bravery and because of her attitude that she would only find healing by helping others. She insisted that she was not a victim but a survivor. She said: 'We are only powerless when we fail to act with goodness and determination' and 'Respect yourself and remember that an injury to one woman is an injury to all'."

Thank you for standing with women like Susan

My name is Susan and when I was 13 years old I underwent female genital mutilation (FGM) and was forced to marry, ending my education.

Many years later, I attended ActionAid training sessions about FGM and child marriage. A group of us women decided we needed to be a voice for the vulnerable girls in our community. Together we founded our Women's Network.

We work with communities explaining the dangers of FGM and child marriage. We also visit schools and speak to the boys and girls to change the views of the younger generation. Girls know they can come to me if they are in trouble and are able to stay in our safe house.

I feel that my biggest accomplishment is that all of the girls - over 150 - who have sought my help are in school and continuing their education.
