Anti Slavery Day

Soroptimist International of Yorkshire's Anti Slavery Group attended the Wilberforce House Museum on Wednesday 18th October to raise awareness of Modern Day Slavery. This is a growing crime and covers a wide range of exploitations including:

- Sexual exploitation, forced labour, organ harvesting, forced criminality, domestic servitude and forced begging;
- Online abuse including sexting; this is the sharing of inappropriate images on social media sites such as Snapchat. This can lead to the blackmailing of people and ultimately to online grooming.

The group produced a range of displays highlighting the types of slavery within our area and up to date data of slavery within the different Police Force areas across Yorkshire and Humberside.

The most common type of exploitation during the first two quarters of the year according to the National

Referral statistics was domestic servitude with sexual exploitation as the second most common type.



During the day Soroptimists spoke to visitors to the Wilberforce House Museum and comments ranged from, 'there is no slavery in Hull' to 'I hadn't thought about organ harvesting as a form of exploitation' and everything between the two. Two videos were shown and resources such as FGM and Forced Marriage booklets and our 'Loves me, Loves me Not' and 'Friends' Bookmarks were given out.



Simply the Best

SI Yorkshire's West Cluster received the Economic Empowerment Best Practice Award at the Federation Conference in Cardiff for their Together Women Project.

The project was as direct result of work undertaken by the UKPAC in partnership with the Prison Reform Trust and is focused on empowering women to promote realistic change within their lives.

The project moves women out of crime and away from damaging lifestyles into more positive futures, working with them in safe, women-only spaces, building their resilience and empowering them to learn new skills. The majority of the women attending are newly released from prison or on community orders. The possibility of staff working with self-referrals has greatly reduced due to cuts in funding, therefore our services are even more critical.

Members have been involved at many different levels - from the weekly Knit & Natter or other craft activity sessions facilitated by Soroptimists from Bingley, Bradford, Ilkley, Keighley and Skipton in Craven donating clothes, bedding, welcome packs for women in need and through

the funding of activities/gifts for the women and children.

Our donations of welcome packs, clothes, money to support their activities have been vital.



Our weekly activities are greatly appreciated by both the TWP staff and the users themselves appreciate the opportunity to talk and be listened to as they develop their communication and social skills. We have observed how they have grown in confidence. Some users who have learned to knit have found that learning new skills has increased their self-esteem, their ability to re-engage with the family, and take their minds off addiction issues.

'Failing our Children- Shattering Secrets, Rebuilding Lives'

This was the fourth day conference that has been led by Yorkshire's Anti Slavery Group. Held at the West Yorkshire Playhouse on November 10th it was attended by 40 professionals and Soroptimists. Our speakers were Christina Gabbitas - children's author, Rita Leaman- from SI Scarborough and a psychotherapist as well as DS Ian Mitchell and Sue Tinnion. The latter two are part of the Multi- Agency Safeguarding Hub in Bradford. The day was chaired by President Chris who made sure that the day flowed well and that the delegates were able to network and leave determined to enable children to have positive outcomes and face a healthy future.



'Share some Secrets' is the children's book which has led Christina into a new avenue in her career

and she is now passionate about raising awareness- and finding the way forward- about child abuse in all its forms. She spent two years researching the book and now she is involved in taking that message wherever she can get. 'Reach Out, Speak Out' is an outcome of the opening of doors in safeguarding- a conference at the Royal Armouries on February 1st 2018 of which she is a driving force.

Rita emphasised the importance of 'emotional health' in our lives. Mental health issues are very much news but positive mental health is a result of the emotional health we grow up with. If children are exposed to abuse then it will shatter lives unless positive role models and positive values are presented.

lan Mitchell and Sue Tinnion gave us hope in the way that services have developed over the last few years and there is a positive outcome when agencies work together on safeguarding issues. Bradford is leading the way on this and it was good to hear the difference this is making to outcomes.

The feedback has been very positive and Chris did take part on Radio Five Live later that day- in a programme where Christina was being interviewed. Tweets were also being sent all day by our 'Tweeters' and having many responses.

Helping the Stroke Unit

Joint Presidents of SI Selby, Rita Pearson and Pat Griffiths, recently presented the Stroke Unit at York District Hospital with 25 washbags put together by their members.

The Leeds University along with the Trust had taken part in a research study around creating good rehabilitation environments for survivors of stroke and involving some past patients to contribute as to what would make a better environment for a patient to start their long



rehabilitation programme. The patients were videoed and part of what they said on film was around personal hygiene – being able to shower and shave and wash their hair and have their hair cut if they wanted – all this made them feel better and more able to focus on the long journey ahead. President Rita said "We are delighted in being able to help patients in their recovery by providing this small service."

Selby Soroptimists were delighted to meet with Anna Foster from Selby and Craven IDAS (Independent Domestic Abuse Service) at their recent meeting. IDAS is the largest specialist charity in Yorkshire supporting people affected by domestic abuse and sexual violence. SI Selby have been awarded an IDAS Ambassador Club Certificate in recognition of their support for tackling domestic abuse. As an Ambassador Club, SI Selby are raising awareness of the work of IDAS and are working with other Soroptimist Clubs in Yorkshire to support initiatives aimed at tackling all forms of domestic abuse and supporting victims.

Golden Celebrations

SI Skipton in Craven

SI Skipton in Craven celebrated the 50th Anniversary of their first meeting in their Clubroom on Otley Street. It was also their Interclub Evening, as well as being International Friendship Day

Their special guest was Chris Clark, incoming President of the Yorkshire Region. The club also took advantage of the gathering to present Chris Clark with bags and toiletry items for distribution to trafficked victims in the Yorkshire Region. The Speaker for the evening was Tim Crossley who spoke about the Mystery of the Dugdale Medals.

With the vision and financial support of founder members in 1956 a building fund was started to provide their own club-room. Adjoining properties in Otley Street were bought and redesigned by founder member Mary Wales who was one of the first female Architects. The building was to include a ground floor club-room and two first floor residential flats. The first meeting in the club-room was held on 3rd October 1967

exactly 18 years after the first club meeting.

Since that time the Clubroom has been available for hire by many, many local organisations as a base for their meetings, celebration, and events, thus providing a valuable service to the Skipton community.

Just before half-term President Jane presented prizes, given by SI Skipton in Craven, to pupils at Greatwood Primary School, Skipton, for the best posters created on the topic of what makes a good friend. At the start of the Autumn Term 200 "Friends" bookmarks were given to the school by the club along with suggestions for how they could be incorporated into a project on Friendship. One side, which is red, has a list of warning signs and behaviours that suggest that someone wanting to 'be your friend' may have a hidden and dangerous agenda. The reverse side, which is green, lists the actions and behaviours a good friend would exhibit such as politeness, encouragement and a willingness to listen. The

bookmarks were a result of work done by pupils of Trinity All Saints CE Primary School, in Bingley, and were developed with the SI Bingley. The aim is to safeguard children from unhealthy relationships.

Greatwood pupils spent a week focusing on Friendship. They created posters and each year group produced a display.

In her personal life, Janet was happily married to Duncan for many years, and was a supportive stepmother. She swam regularly at Walton Hall and was a member of The Wakefield Luncheon Club. Consequently she had a wide circle of friends, and will be missed by many.
