Ilkley Focus on IWD

International Women's Day was the focus for Ilkley Soroptimists to involve the local community in appreciating the importance of safe water. The average daily trek made by women and girls for clean water in the poorest countries, was replicated with a mid week five mile walk entitled 'Walk in her Shoes'. This directly supported the national initiative by the same name under the umbrella of CARE

International. At weekend the Soroptimists held a very successful town centre happening of music and dance to celebrate International Women's Day and the joy of safe water. A full day programme featuring local Primary Schools, Choirs, Boy Bands, Soloists, Ukulele Groups and a Dance Academy drew the crowds at the bandstand. Information displays and quizzes about the transport of water by

women and girls attracted parents, children and the wider public. Local supermarkets provided wrapped sweets to children completing the auiz. Soroptimists had visited Brownies and Guides who provided 'feet bunting' for the Walk in her Shoes event as well as trailing the weight of carrying water. A parallel street collection staged by Soroptimists raised £650 for CARE International, who also promoted and on- line giving facility for the charity. This event attracted many different sections of the community as co-workers, performers and audiences, not only raising the profile of Soroptimists, but making real the benefits of safe water in bringing health, education, food security and a way out of poverty for many women and girls.

Celebrating Harare's 60th Anniversary

This month, I was fortunate enough to go with my fellow club member, Michele Herdman, to join in the celebrations for SI Harare's 60th anniversary. This club (originally SI Salisbury) was the first Soroptimist club in Africa so the anniversary was really that of African Soroptimism.

Those of you who have visited our sisters in Zimbabwe know that they value our friendship highly and going there to see their work certainly brings home just how isolated they are in Soroptimist terms: there are five clubs of approximately 20 members each in a huge country with multiple problems. That's just 100 Soroptimists. Even if they had treble that membership, the amount they achieve would still be phenomenal.

We spent most of our time with SI Harare but members from all the other clubs joined in the celebrations, so we had a real catch up with everyone. I understand that each Zimbabwean club is linked with a Yorkshire club, though I'm not sure whether these are all formal friendship links. I think these are the links: SI Harare / SI Richmond and Dales, SI Uyanda / SI Keighley, SI Vabatsiri / SI Ilkley, SI Kwe Kwe / SI Wakefield, SI Bulawayo / SI Leeds.

Whilst there, I had a chat with several of them to find out what they need from the friendship link with SI Yorkshire. It appears that they are working on active projects with the individual

clubs with which they are linked but that they see the SI Yorkshire link as an umbrella or mother organisation. They say that they just want SI Yorkshire to be there if needed: the economy is on another downturn and the future is always uncertain, so knowing that we are there to give support if needed is very reassuring to them all. Also we were asked whether, in the event of any joint projects between the clubs winning an award, we would highlight the national/regional link.



They have new chairs in the common room at the SODA home for the destitute elderly, but the soroptimists are engaged in a constant struggle to provide food and keep it edible with daily electricity cuts.

As for the time spent with SI Harare last week, here are a few pictures of the highlights.



The traditional birthing attendants hold up a placard saying "without SI we were nothing". They repeatedly told us how we are "their mothers". The aim of the project is to support trained village women to attend other women in childbirth and thereby reduce maternal and neonatal mortality and morbidity. The spin-off is that the TBAs themselves have achieved status in their communities and self-esteem.

Hats off to the Sailors

Sheila Miller, a member of Garforth Elmet, dreamed of transforming a piece of waste land outside St. Gemma's Hospice where she works as a volunteer. Her idea was to make a small garden where relatives and patients could find peace and quiet. This dream evolved into another idea to make a tree with remembrance leaves which could be hung on the tree in memory of loved ones.

Sheila asked the club to help and raise money for the project which was agreed. Sheila sourced copper from a window display at Harvey Nichols, Leeds, who also sent her the copper from the London store. A sculptor, a fabrication company and an engraver were found and Paul Spencer, husband of Garforth member Janette Hawkins-Spencer built the walls, fountain area, installed lighting and flag stones.

On completion in 2005 the Club held an opening ceremony and said prayers. In the intervening ten years, the Hospice has raised \pounds 155,481.00 in donations.

An author was so inspired by the tree in the Hospice, and wrote a children's book 'The Copper Tree'. It is set in a school where a teacher dies and the children cope with the grief with a Copper Tree. Unfortunately the author did not know the SI Garforth Elmet involvement when she wrote the book; otherwise we would have been mentioned.

Murder! Yorkshire President key suspect

1960s HeartRate scenes were filmed in Harrogate at the Cedar Court Hotel but to the shock of the actors, extras and crew, a camera man and actor were mysteriously stabbed to death between breaks. Interrogation of all those on set took place by the local constabulary and not everyone could provide an alibi. Shockingly for members of Soroptimist International Harrogate and District and Yorkshire, who had been invited to take part in the filming as extras, their Yorkshire President, Angela Edward and club member, Val Hills, were listed as key suspects after all enquiries were held. Val Hills alibi, despite being late, soon came through and she was released. President Angela remained a key suspect but the murderer was soon identified as the make-up artist.

Twenty Years of Caring

Twenty years ago, Skipton Child Contact Centre was set up by members of SI of Skipton in Craven as a form of community service. 20 years later, it is one of 403 Contact Centres across the country, under the parent body of NACCC - National Association of Child Contact Centres. On the first and third Saturdays of every month, volunteers welcome estranged parents to the centre, where the children can spend time with the parent they don't live with, in safe and pleasant surroundings with lots of toys and games and, in the summer, a small garden to play in. The other parent can meanwhile drink tea or coffee and read magazines, or go out into Skipton, knowing that the child is being supervised by volunteers while playing with Mum or Dad. The centre, in the Soroptimist Rooms in Otley Street, can accommodate up to 6 children in any one session. The average length of time for the parents to use the centre is about 6 months, as it usually becomes possible for the child to see the other parent outside the centre. Sometime the child will only come for $\, I \,$ or $\, 2 \,$ sessions; sometimes for a year or more. Initial contact with the coordinator of the centre is through the parents' solicitors and often follows

court proceedings. Recently, this has become more difficult because of the huge cutbacks in Legal Aid, which across the country has meant fewer children being able to see the absent parent. At the Skipton Centre, however, families are still seeking to use the facilities, which are free of charge thanks to the free use of the Soroptimist Rooms.

Will the need still be there in another 20 years? Sadly, it looks increasingly likely, but meanwhile the volunteers are kept busy. A session on a sunny Saturday, using the little garden attached, watching children playing happily with the parent they can't normally meet, is reward itself.

We handed out numerous posters, leaflets and cards.as well as 200 'Loves

me Loves me not' bookmarks. And the SI Yorkshire pull-up banners attracted much attention and possibly new recruits to SI Yorkshire.

So, a very successful day and one to be repeated while ever CSE continues to rear its ugly head in our society.
