More delicious food and fascinating conversation followed! And on Thursday morning it was sadly time to go home again, but not before we discussed where we might go on another of these reunions.

SI Garforth Elmet has been supporting Inkwel Arts which creates space for people to develop positive mental health. Based in Chapel Allerton in Leeds Inkwel is an outlet of the charity Mind.

The Inkwel centre encourages participation in a wide variety of crafts, music and dance aiming to help people with mental health issues. There are support groups and drop in groups for developing mindfulness and meditation skills. The general public are encouraged to use the cafe and to attend the cinema and jazz events.



SI Garforth Elmet learned about Inkwel from a guest speaker and visited the centre to see the various activities in progress. A donation of £700 has been made to support the centre and provide for craft

materials.

Support for Near and Far

SI Harrogate & District

The Red Box Project is a Nationwide Campaign that ensures local schools are equipped with free sanitary wear for young girls to access, thereby ensuring no one misses out on their education because of their monthly period. The Harrogate Project is co-ordinated by Jay Kelly and members of Soroptimist International of Harrogate & District are supporting her by running the scheme across all local primary schools.

Girls are starting their periods at a much earlier age than they used to and can be embarrassed and upset if a period starts whilst at school or worse they cannot afford sanitary protection.

Jay quotes stories of real period poverty across the area and tales of embarrassment at lack of provision in schools.

Jackie Snape Chief Executive of Yorkshire Disability Action has

provided a free storage room and staff help by unpacking and storing donated sanitary wear. Jackie says it is good for larger charities to support smaller local organisations. Not only have they supported but in doing so it has raised awareness amongst learners who are all younger disabled people, as to what is a normal monthly occurrence for ladies.

The spring statement brought excellent news that sanitary protection will be provided in all secondary schools as a result of the constant lobbying by Red Box but to date primary schools have not been included so the campaign goes on.



SI Harrogate and District were proud to recognise the long service by four members to the organisation totalling 155 years!

Janet Hutton had achieved 40 years service, Nicola Harding, Hilary Waddington and Judith Webb 30 years, and Liz Stickney 25 years.

Yorkshire President Pat

Kilbane presented long service certificates to each member, who all continue in active roles within the club.

SI Harrogate & District are working on a new project with their friendship link SI Blantyre (Malawi) to support a local school building a new library with the club supplying computers and books. With 15 months to raise £2000 the club has challenged members to double their money with each member being given £10.

The project was launched with a Boom Bang A Bang Eurovision party held by Val Hills Andrea Trimmer and Gillian Trotter. The evening was full of great fun with guests dressed to represent their country in the sweepstake, a Smorgasbord of European food and Eurovision games.

Over £130 was raised towards the project.



Inspiring Women

The approach of International Women's Day 2019 prompted SI Ilkley to get together with Ilkley Fairtrade Group to highlight women's achievements- particularly women living in the local community. The two groups had worked together previously successfully celebrating IWD a few years ago. (Remember a photograph including a banana on a zebra crossing?)

We agreed that we know of so many inspiring women all over the world in both our organisations who are celebrated for their achievements. This time we would let our community know the extent of work done by many women locally.

We created posters and leaflets which were headed 'Wanted- local Superwoman' and had a series of articles in the local paper. People were encouraged to nominate those women they knew who worked tirelessly on projects but who were largely uncelebrated. We began in February with a community stall at the local Real Food Fair and had a celebratory evening in early April. During this period we promoted it on the local 'Ilkley Chat', Facebook and Twitter as well as word of mouth.

We ended with 19 women nominated- 3 more than once! We had appointed an independent panel of 3 to decide on a winner but all were to receive certificates. The judges found the task a privilege and the quality of the nominees made it

difficult to select one person. Karen Goodman was given that honour receiving a huge hamper of Fair Trade goods as well as a special certificate. Having 3 adopted children with special needs she is celebrated for her role in supporting families with special needs in local groups having helped to found 2 of them.



The award evening was a joyful occasion where most of the nominees and nominators attended. The judges gave their observations and reasons for their decision, Soroptimism and Fair Trade were promoted and the certificates awarded by the Ilkley Town Mayor. Many photographs were taken, wine and canapés enjoyed and much conversation ensued!

A further article was in the local press and the strong feeling was that it should become a regular event in Ilkley! A very special evening!

It's that time of the year again when SI Richmond & Dales welcome students from Richmond School to take part in our SOS (sharing our skills) project. We usually take 2 girls from year 12 to join us at 3 club, and 2 executive meetings to learn how a club functions. However, we had 7 eager students wanting to join us, so instead of choosing we invited all 7.



They have hit the ground running with their enthusiasm for supporting the club's projects and have already drawn up plans to raise money for Toilet Twinning in their school and supporting the local food bank with products to combat

Period Poverty. They are a confident, friendly, articulate and enthusiastic group of students who bring a breath of fresh air to the club. We should all try this method and spread the word of Soroptimism to the younger generation.

Richmond & Dale Soroptimists celebrated International Women's Day by organising a talk entitled Step by Step by Ghazala Ahmad-Mear. A full audience listened to a truly inspiring woman talking about her walk in 2018 to the South Pole on an expedition using only renewable energy. Ghazala is married to the explorer Roger Mear who in 1986, with Robert Swan and Gareth Wood, made the first unsupported walk to the South Pole with the expedition 'In the footsteps of Scott'. Ghazala, who was a NHS Surgeon, shared her training programme with us and explained that Antarctica - the last great wilderness - is under threat from global warming. Glaciers are retreating and ice shelves the size of France are breaking up. By using only renewable energy on her walk, her strong message to us is, if we can survive the coldest, driest and most inhospitable place on Earth, then step by step we can make similar changes to our everyday lives and have a positive effect on climate change.

Safe House Awareness

SI Scarborough

EVA Women's Aid is an award-winning Charity providing specialist support for victims of domestic abuse and sexual violence. Based in Redcar, EVA's services include four Safe House properties for women fleeing abuse. As an independent Charity with 32 years experience, EVA relies entirely on grant funding, donations and fundraising. CEO Richinda Taylor said; 'We are very grateful that SI Scarborough supports us, not only with donations but by collecting toiletries and other items that we give to our residents'

Women arriving in one of their Safe Houses are given a pack containing toiletries, underwear and pyjamas, as often they arrive without any possessions. SI Scarborough have held 'sewing evenings' where drawstring bags are made for these items, which the women use after as laundry bags.

Domestic abuse and sexual violence are not easy issues to discuss. Richinda added; 'Our shop-fronted offices in Redcar's High Street represent a different approach for this sector – we bring it into public view, showing it cannot be ignored. Ignoring abuse allows it to perpetuate'

Every week, two women are killed by a current or former partner, and there are more than 1.3 million female victims each year in the UK. Domestic abuse amounts to 16% of all violent crime and has more repeat victims than any other crime-it is clear this is a huge issue to be addressed. (ONS/CSEW).

Women victims are by far the greater majority but we know that reported figures are only half the story. In 2018, EVA

worked with 923 women, with numbers increasing yearly. Over half of the women EVA works with choose not to access the Criminal Justice System—it's their choice, and EVA supports them in whatever decisions they make. Richinda said; 'we have received more and more referrals for women with mental health issues. We respond by providing new Safe House accommodation for women fleeing abuse who also have mental health problem such as PTSD, anxiety or depression – which may be a result of the trauma they have experienced – and employing specialist Mental Health Support Workers. Support is totally needs-led – women can access EVA for as long as they need to, until they feel empowered to live independent lives'

In 2015, EVA opened the UK's first (and only) Safe House for older women as part of their award-winning '45+ Project'. This new house is the organisations fourth in the Redcar area.

Dena was born in Scarborough in April 1922. She qualified as a teacher and eventually became Headmistress at two schools in Scarborough. She retired in 1980 having set up a nursery unit at the school and the first ever autistic unit in a mainstream school.

She was appointed as a Magistrate in 1967, became a Soroptimist in 1967, and in 1970 was awarded an MBE for services to education.

Dena travelled widely, loved sport and loved living by the sea.

She was a wise, much respected, humorous and well-informed Soroptimist, who played an active role in the club until a few weeks before she died. We miss her invaluable contributions to our meetings.

Lesley Anne Pears SI Northallerton

Lesley Anne Pears was born 28th September 1960 and sadly died 23rd March 2019 following a heroic battle against breast cancer.
