SI Selby has two Club Friendship links with SI clubs in Europe: SI Frankenthal, Germany and SI Dnipro, Ukraine. During the pandemic, the three Clubs met regularly on zoom. Everyone enjoyed these meetings: catching up on each others' news, talking about Soroptimist activities, making and maintaining friendships.

A zoom meeting was arranged with the three Clubs for Tuesday 8 March. This was before the Russian invasion into Ukraine. Previously, there would be a number of members from SI Dnipro. Sadly, none of them were able to join us on International Women's Day.

SI Selby has been in email contact with our friends in Dnipro, offering our love, prayers and support. This contact ceased on Wednesday 8 March. We hope it will be restored.

In the meantime, we know that one member is in Poland with her granddaughter, another has moved out of Dnipro into the country to be with her old and ailing Mother, and a third is trying to leave Dnipro. In her last e mail, she wrote "maybe I'll try to leave: (Dnipro) has been attacked at night for the third day in a row. I take my iPad with me. So far, I don't know what type of transport I will have to go on, on what day (the queues for leaving the Dnipro are unprecedented) and to which country I'll be able to get".

The IWD zoom meeting went ahead with SI Frankenthal and SI Selby. The members of SI Dnipro, their families and Ukraine were very much in our thoughts. We sent them every good wish on a day, which is usually celebrated as a holiday in Ukraine.

Members lit a peace candle at the meeting on the 2nd March.

Appeal to SI clubs

No:63 Hotel

Past SIY President Rita Leaman appeals to members:

On Saturday, January 22nd 2022, The (Soroptimist) No:63 Hotel in London, held their AGM on Zoom. Shareholders have been asked to make an appeal to clubs.

(For those who don't know about the No:63 Hotel, here is the link to the hotel. https://number63.co.uk) There is a short film on SI Yorkshire Facebook page.

As many of you know, the hotel was severely hit by the pandemic. In the end of year accounts, in 52 trading weeks, No:63 was only open for six weeks out of fiftytwo weeks. Opening was further disrupted by the severely damaging flash floods in the area in July 2021. The repair to the damaged fabric of this listed building, has been estimated as between £150,000 -200,00 There was also a bill of £65,000 in compensation to residents and staff for losses accrued due to the flood damage. The battle with the insurance companies continues.

The No:63 Board has confirmed that they will definitely be keeping the hotel open and there is a new management team, headed by Victoria. To this end the Board of No:63 need any assistance to publicise the hotel, that can be made by No:63 shareholders and Soroptimist club members.

There are four ways that members can help.

- I. Stay at the hotel.
- 2. Become a shareholder.
- 3. Purchase more shares if you are already a shareholder.
- 4. Buy a number for the 500 draw (much like the SI Yorkshire 250 club) or buy two or more numbers. Clubs can buy numbers too. They are £12 per number annually.

Some clubs put a $\pounds I$ of each member's subscription towards a number. Perhaps your club already does this?

The second Mirfield Friendship café of the year took place on February 4th, well attended by many of the regulars and a number of new faces.



To celebrate International Women's Day this year, the Kirklees College Creative Industries department hosted an art exhibition in collaboration with SI Dewsbury. The level 3/4 Art, Design and Media Practice students were tasked with responding to a live brief set by SI based around the 16 Days of Activism and International Women's Day to incite meaningful conversations about gender equality.

The exhibition took place in the atrium at the Huddersfield Centre where 58 pieces of work were on display and was attended by staff and students with their family and friends.

Over 40 students completed the live brief as part of their work placement on their study programmes. The judging panel selected two winners with nine runners up who they felt best responded to the brief with new and original ideas. All students who completed the brief were presented with a certificate by Steve Plumstead, Curriculum Area Manager for Creative Industries and guests from Soroptimist International at the awards ceremony.

Linda Davis and Pat Thornes from SI Dewsbury commented: "When we contacted Kirklees College we were delighted that Steve, Emma and Grace agreed to run both 16 days of activism and International Women's Day as briefs. We were so impressed with the work the students have done that we really struggled to pick winners.

The work the students have done is thought provoking, making even us as soroptimists think about the research behind the art work. The work is just such high quality, a lot more advanced than what we initially expected and we did many years ago. We are so happy to be here tonight to see all the work and we hope to work with Kirklees College again next year."

Starters For Four

Ilkley Soroptimists handover four Home Starter Packs to Keighley Refuge

Ilkley Soroptimists heard an overview of life during COVID at The Keighley Refuges, where there are 5 to 10 referrals for every place, with an age range from 17 to 78. Ilkley members agreed to put together packs of essentials for those leaving the refuge with no belongings and having left their family and friends. When moving into social housing they are given a new bed, new bed linen, a microwave and a fridge freezer from the Phoenix Fund. The four starter packs already handed over by Ilkley Soroptimists include kitchen essentials, duvets, cleaning equipment.

The 2 Keighley Refuges are managed through Staying Put, a Bradford based voluntary organisation which aims to keep people in their own homes, if practical allowing children to continue in their school. Staying Put works closely with the police and often deploys lock changes, panic alarms and 'key houses'.

Ilkley Soroptimists are continuing to fundraise, the latest packs being financed by a fashion show, whilst Ilkley have an ongoing collection of toiletries for the Refuge.

SI Harrogate and District's first face-to-face meeting of 2022 showcased their Programme Action work. After welcoming two new members, Lynne Clark and Jan Pratt, President Val Hills introduced a number of speakers.

Jo Swire from IDAS told members about the work of Women's Refuges in the Harrogate and Ripon Areas. Then Jenna Collins, the Children and Young People's Service Manager from Just'B', part of North Yorkshire Hospice Care spoke about the pre-bereavement, bereavement and emotional well-being support their team gives to young people and the work they do in partnership with local schools.

Finally Chris Wild, from Yorkshire Energy Systems, delivered a fascinating talk on sustainable energy and how airsource heat pumps and solar panels could be the quickest way to achieve Net Zero carbon emissions by 2050.

Soroptimists Honour Past Members

Despite the rain, President Val Hills planted a tree by the River Wharfe in Wetherby in February. The tree, a silver birch, was planted in memory of past members and follows the planting of trees in Ripon and Harrogate to celebrate over 100 years of Soroptimism.



President Val and 12 members of the club, including three from Wetherby, were delighted to be joined by the Mayor of Wetherby, Councillor Neil O'Byrne, who spoke of the invaluable work done for women and girls by Soroptimists in the district.

Resurrected Bites

Founder and CEO of Resurrected Bites, Michelle Hayes, gave a talk to members. She talked about the two cafes and community grocery stores the charity has set up in Harrogate and Knaresborough since early 2018. Explaining how the Covid pandemic affected their plans, they quickly adapted and between March 2020 and July 2021 had delivered food and other essential items to the equivalent of 15808 people in the Harrogate area. Afterwards, President Val Hills presented Michelle with a cheque for £100.

Sue Murray died on 15th February 2022 at the age of 98. She was a long standing member of SI Sheffield joining in the mid 1970s and serving as President 1985/6.

Her Soroptimist category was voluntary social worker and she was awarded an MBE for voluntary work, setting up and running a school clothing service, in 1995.

She was Mistress Cutler alongside her husband Graham who was Master Cutler in 1974. Sue and Graham had 3 daughters - one of whom Jane - is also a member of SI Sheffield.

She was a private person in many ways but very kind and

generous and always willing to help.

Sue exemplified a life of service to others and was involved with many different Sheffield charities throughout her life.

She will be sadly missed.

Christine Withers 1931-2022 SI Dewsbury & District



Christine died on March 1st in the Care Home where she had lived for three years following a fall at home. She joined SI Dewsbury in 1978 her Category was Principal Catering Officer for Kirklees MBC and following retirement in 1987 Justice of the Peace a position she held with pride.

She was club President in 1985/6 with charities of Cancer Relief and Multiple Sclerosis and attended the International convention in Melbourne in 1987. She was an Honorary member of SI Dewsbury.

Christine had many sporting involvements- hockey, tennis, cricket and badminton. In 1998 she became Captain of the Yorkshire Veteran Ladies Golf Association organising county matches and championships at Dewsbury District Golf Club, her lowest handicap being eight. She was also a member of Hanging Heaton Golf Club.

She was a Past President of the Ladies Lifeboat Guild. Other interests included gardening, travelling, photography and bridge.

She will be greatly missed by nephew Martin and members.
