


SI EASTBOURNE TOOK part in the Big Plastic Count in May. Members, and some family members, counted every single piece of plastic packaging that we threw away during the week and submitted the details to the Big Plastic Count website, however it was disposed of – in the refuse bin, the recycling bin or in a bin when we were out of the house.

The aim of the project was to carry out the biggest ever investigation into household plastic waste.

The data collected will be submitted to the government to push them to take bold action on plastic. The hope is to get a target set of a reduction of 50% of single use plastic by 2025.

As individuals, we found it a real eye opener to receive our individual, personal plastic footprint, informing us how many pieces of plastic per year we were responsible for and this has led to an increased commitment to reduce plastic use as much as we can.

Soroptimists Support Byron Fun Run for Mary's Meals



THE CHILDREN AT Byron Primary School in Gillingham are working to become a 'Rights Respecting School' and have chosen Mary's Meals as their charity to support.

This followed a presentation in January about Mary's Meals by Medway and Maidstone member, Annette Davies who is an Ambassador for Mary's Meals.

Mary's Meals have set up school feeding programmes in some of the world's poorest communities, where poverty and hunger prevent children from gaining an education. It costs just £15.90 to feed a child for a whole school year. Mary's Meals are now feeding 2,279,941 children every school day.

The school catchment area in North Gillingham is a deprived area with many families facing the current cost of living challenges. Plans for any fundraising efforts needed to reflect this

It was decided to hold one mile Fun Runs for all 500 children to take part in the school playground during their PE lessons during the week June 13-17. A target of £500 was set to be raised hoping that each child could get family or friends to



sponsor them for a £1. Posters were drawn by the children with motivational messages to decorate the playground.

On a beautiful sunny Monday morning, Soroptimist members, Stella and Jane Barnes assisted teaching staff in putting up the colourful posters along with Mary's Meals posters and bunting in the two playgrounds.

Club members who could not take part in the preparations and decorating for the Fun Runs generously donated monies totalling £250 to help the school achieve the target they had set.

On June 21, these monies were presented to Hayley Hayes at Byron School. She confirmed that the Fun Runs had been a success involving all the childre,n and with sponsorship from families and friends they had raised more than £3400 for Mary's Meals. This is the largest amount Byron School has ever raised with their fundraising efforts.

This money will mean that 213 children in one of the poorest communities will be fed for a whole school year and be able to gain an education.

Volunteering at Dane John Gardens



CANTERBURY SOROPTIMISTS HAVE been raising money for a garden project at the Canterbury women's refuge, which is run by Clarion Housing Group. After standing in charity car park events in Whitstable during 2021 and 2022, through rain, wind and, thankfully, sunshine, over £900 was collected from members of the public.

The refuge consists of 12 self-contained flats for women and children escaping domestic abuse. The garden, whilst large, was empty and unwelcoming so the staff at Clarion asked if we could make it more of a community space for the women and children.

Volunteers from another organisation painted garden seats and tables and Canterbury Club bought sun parasols, a garden bench and a bistro set for outdoor rest and relaxation. In addition, members supplied ceramic pots with a bay tree sapling, tomato plants and garden mint bushes with a view to the residents having some home grown produce.

To attract bees and other pollinators, the club also donated pots of lavender, together with bulbs of bee-friendly flowers so the children could enjoy planting and watching insect wildlife in their garden space. A bug hotel, which is now in a secluded corner, was also bought for the children to investigate any beetles and solitary bees that might take up residence.

Danni*, one of the children living at the refuge, made a thankyou card for the Club (see front page), with a lovely self-portrait, expressing the appreciation of all the women and children, especially as everything was installed in good time for their Platinum Jubilee garden party.


SI Thanet bring together themes, concerns, passions and values for World Book Day

DURING LOCKDOWN AND other Covid restrictions, one would have thought there would be plenty of time for catching up on unread books. I don't know about you, but I certainly found it very difficult until I was on holiday. Luckily for SI Thanet, our member Denise had no problem identifying a lockdown read that was completely suitable for us to use to mark World Book Day.

Our plan was to donate a copy of an appropriate book to as many Thanet secondary school libraries as we could within our budget. Rather than order through Amazon, Denise contacted our local independent book shop 'The Margate Bookshop' and told them about our idea. They were lovely and shared their own initiative of community funding to provide local schools with more books (definitely something we can support/promote!).

They also generously let us have copies at cost price meaning we could afford to gift one to all secondary schools in Thanet. The next idea was to contact Manjeet Mann the author and ask if she would kindly sign the copies. She was touched with our idea and was happy to do this. We were then able to raise awareness of her women/girls initiative in Folkestone 'Run the World' on a book plate within each book to explain how we were gifting them.

The 'book' takes the form of a narrative poem about two teenagers from opposite worlds and was the WINNER of the Costa Children's Book Award 2021. Entitled The Crossing, the review in the Observer said 'The Crossing is a profound story of hope, grief and the very real tragedies of the refugee crisis, The sea carries our pain...' The LoveReading 4Kids review includes:- 'The premise of this fascinating book is two teenagers from opposite sides of the world who form a connection through odd circumstances. Natalie has just lost her Mum to cancer and struggles to find a calm place in the world, whilst her brother reacts by rebelling and joining a hate filled far right anti-refugee protest and action group. Sammy has had to leave his home in Eritrea on the chance of a new life in Europe – running from conscription into the army, which is a form of slavery in his home country. Both characters have huge issues to face. Sammy's



seem more obviously dangerous and overwhelming, though Natalie's are equally as difficult – without the imminent danger. Told through a narrative poem using both voices to alternately express their fears, dilemmas and friendships this is a book you really can't put down. You have to know if Sammy and Natalie do get to meet.'

The author Manjeet Mann is an actress, playwright, screen-writer and director. She is the founder of Run The World, an organisation that works with women and girls from marginalized backgrounds and helps to empower them through sport and storytelling. Manjeet came from a socio-economic disadvantaged background, growing up in an area of deprivation in The Black Country in the 1990s. She is an acclaimed writer and producer of several one woman shows and episodic plays of personal monologues, exploring womanhood across the socio-economic spectrum. She lives in Kent.

Federation Consultative Council Report from FCC Jan Doyle

I ATTENDED THE last virtual meeting of the SIGBI board as an observer at the end of April when we were introduced to our new Director of Finance, Reena Bhanotha, who is, I am sure you know, a member of Croydon Club. I am sure you will join with me in wishing her every success in this role.

We learnt that SI President Maureen is keen to set up a Youth Forum and I am sure we will hear more about this.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership continues to be a concern for our Federation and although new clubs have been chartered in India and the Caribbean, in the UK our membership is declining with clubs closing.

Our region was well represented at the recent Membership Webinars when it was recognised that the pandemic has brought change to the way that many of us meet, with more and more clubs being able to embrace hybrid meetings and that smaller clubs are becoming the norm. Unfortunately, we have seen a decline in the membership within our own region – 221 full club members for the current year (238 in the previous year).

Nisha Ghosh, director of Marketing and Communications is working with Membership Director Chevonne on an external marketing campaign for the 40-50 age group with the aim of building SIGBI'S external profile to attract new members.

PROGRAMME

So far as Programme is concerned, President Elect Ruth Healey recently undertook an analysis of PFRFs on the database for the period April 01, 2020 to March 31, 2022 and has found that overall clubs within the federation have raised over £1m and have helped over 200,000 women and girls — an impressive achievement and one that we should widely publicise.

However overall, the submission of programme focus report forms continues to be patchy with a 30% drop over the last two years, although there is a slight increase in those relating to climate change.

Programme Director Kay went on to report that registration for CSW 2022 was disappointing, particularly when compared to 2021. It was felt that the parallel event website was not as good as last year's, and this has been fed back to New York. The outcome statement from CSW is on the UN Women website and the link has been provided.

There are two commentaries on the SIGBI website on the situation in Ukraine and Afghanistan and Programme Director has written to all clubs regarding donations for Ukraine.

A reminder for all clubs that climate change will be the general focus of the SIGBI Day of Action this year (July 16), with a specific focus on single use plastics.

FEDERATION POSTS

Applications have been received for the posts of Directors of Governance, Membership, PR, Marketing and Communications, APD Prosperity, and Friendship Link Co-ordinator.

A third call has gone out for the post of Director of Programme.

Many of you will, I am sure, have seen on Facebook SI President Maureen's note about SI Commonwealth Representatives with SI calling for applicants who live in or near London – so do please consider this

CONFERENCE

Conference booking for Belfast is now open and it looks as though it will be as exciting and as stimulating as ever. No resolutions have been received for the General Meeting 2022. As with last year, written resolutions will be circulated to Clubs prior to the GM, in relation to the Rules of Conduct of the GM, the SIGBI Ltd Annual Report and GM Minutes 2021.

So far as future conferences are concerned, we were told that London is under consideration as the venue for conference in 2023 and Edinburgh in 2024. Watch this space!

MICRO-FINANCING

The Federation Micro-Financing Group is working well and is supporting 93 women and groups. Current investment stands at £6,900. This includes the original £4,500, plus repaid loans. An additional £5,000 will be invested in June 2022. A PFRF has been submitted on micro-financing.

Finally I would like to thank members for supporting me in my application to continue as your Federation Councillor. I received confirmation from Gina Coad earlier this week that I have been reappointed for a further two years. During that time I do hope that I can get to visit your club – it has been difficult over the last two years to do this, but I had a very enjoyable visit to Tunbridge Wells earlier this week and it would be good to get out to visit other clubs – so please let me know if you would like me to come along.


Sunday was time for Afternoon Tea hosted by Wanda Wright in her large garden looking out over the Medway estuary.

06 USING INSTAGRAM REELS FOR CLUBS

IN JUNE'S EDITION of the monthly PR & Marketing Facebook Live session, Rachel Weinhold and Shreya Bajajshah were discussing using Reels for your club.

Reels have been a thing on Instagram for some time now, but they have also just been introduced to Facebook. So, Rachel and Shreya explained what they are, how they work and how you can use them to benefit your club?

Reels are short, entertaining videos where you can be creative and engage people. Research shows that videos used in this way are better than photos to grab people's attention. You just need a Smart phone, natural light, and creativity.

5 TOP TIPS ON USING INSTAGRAM REELS

1. PLAN YOUR REELS

Think what you are going to do.

The first 3 seconds is important

What is the hook?

What is the call for action?

You need a mixed bag with different content each time. See what other people are doing, especially similar organisations to ourselves.

2. MAKE A GOOD VIDEO

Make the video engaging and interesting.

Always use the senses.

It is better to have 5 people talking for 10 seconds each than one person talking for 50 seconds.

You need to shoot content in portrait (9 x16) in natural light. There are Apps available, some of them free for video editing. 'In-shot' is free and found to be easy

to use with transition and sound effects.

Do not over complicate it.

You will improve with thought and practice.

3. ADD TO YOUR VIDEO

What basics can you add to reels?

Music is a must; explore what is trending and recommended. It gives you options and you need to choose something that is appropriate.

Captions can be added over the video.

Do not make it too busy as will detract from it.

4. USE A GOOD VIDEO DESCRIPTION

Use a # to tell Instagram and Facebook why you need to be searched for and for whom is it intended?

5. CONNECTIONS

Comment on others and build on this.

Being social is what social media is all about.

Collaboration: if a friendship event with another club/charity seek agreement to put on both sites as you will reach more.

Encourage engagement and share it.

Key Message:

'You only learn by doing, you cannot break it - try it..'

As I had led a gardening project previously, I was asked to lead the Tree Project. I identified a site in Ramsgate linking with the Westcliff Conservation & Community Association, the Ramsgate Society, and the Council, next to where I volunteer to maintain two flower beds. It fitted in with initiatives to reduce the incidence of littering, vandalism, and other antisocial behaviour. The flowerbeds and Rose Garden on the Royal Esplanade are maintained by volunteers and are entered in the Britain in Bloom Competition.

Thanet is a new club and we wanted to mark the Centenary by planting a tree locally and raise our profile. Linking with local community organisations, especially those run by volunteers, helps us to identify potential future projects and causes to support. As overall lead I focussed on the community liaison, site identification, planting design and tree selection but certain aspects of the plan were taken up by other members who had identified potential individuals and businesses that had the right expertise. In spite of the Covid restrictions we managed to keep to the plan so that it came together for the planting.

Some of the funds raised from a car boot sale were used to buy the tree and mulch from our local Garden Centre at a generously discounted rate, but the rest of what was needed, such as the plaque, were freely donated by businesses or individuals.

The tree was planted with the help of Scouts, who then received their Community badges. We like to be 'hands on' as a Club so members also mucked in and got their hands and knees dirty. The local organisations that have supported the project also came and lent their help. The accompanying photos show the stages of the project. The tree chosen is an Amelanchier that, according to Monty Don and other gardeners, is an ideal small tree that has interest for all seasons.

The QR code for the Centenary was included on the plaque so that anyone interested can find out more. It may be too soon to judge the effect on behaviour in the area as this is seen as more long term and ongoing. Showing that this part of the area is being maintained and cared for has generated positive comments from those using the Esplanade for dog walking/exercise, both about the tree planting and a reduction in littering.
