
A Taste of Catalonia in Eastbourne



THE 15-MINUTE CITY is an urban planning concept in which "most daily necessities and services, such as work, shopping, education, healthcare and leisure can be easily reached by a 15-minute walk or bike ride from any point in the city". It should reduce car dependency, promote healthy and sustainable living, and improve wellbeing and quality of life. The concept has been described as a "return to a local way of life".

This approach applies to Whitstable and District Soroptimists. Instead of driving a distance to meetings and Programme Action projects, they will be on our doorstep. Five members of SI Canterbury wanted to reduce their travel, focus on local projects and maximise the membership from their local contacts.

To date this focus has attracted back four ex-Soroptimists as well as three brand new members, with more in the offing. Several can walk to the meeting place and no one lives further than a ten minute drive away.

Prospective members are being encouraged to take their time about deciding whether to join and are attracted by local Programme Action and local friendship.

We are working out our values for our Mission Statement and have already decided that we will be a plastic free club. Like every other Soroptimist, we want to make the world a better place, and have fun and friendship whilst we are doing so.

We already support a local multi-bank which offers free goods, clothing, equipment and food to people in need, and we are researching a member's connection with a midwifery project in Bangladesh where we hope to make contact with their local Soroptimists.

The website www.sigbi.org/Whitstable and social media are now up and running.

Wednesdays are Whitstable and District Soroptimist nights. The club meets every month at Whitstable Tescos community space with a social evening in Whitstable, Herne Bay or Faversham in between times.

The Petition* to charter the new club will be presented to SIGBI at the end of July 2023 and the Charter Celebration lunch is planned for Sunday, October 01, at the Crescent Turner Hotel. 
Once completed, the Pole will be topped off with a hand painted, purple roofed bird house and be planted alongside three other Peace Poles near the Soroptimist bench in the Walled Garden Project. The pole used, was a recycled pole sourced by Solo Wood Recycling.

The project to create Peace Poles is an idea that originated in the US which has become an internationally recognised nonreligious symbol of Peace.

The inspiration for the project is what peace means to each of the communities involved and since it started there have been over 250,000 Peace Poles erected across the world by different religious groups, schools, community groups, charities and others.

With this Friends of Park Hill Park arts project we will be connecting with 12 communities across Croydon and hopefully then across the UK and across the world.

Sue Hunt's Garden Party Raises £250 for Itarsi



ITARSI IS A LARGE railway junction town in the centre of India in the Madya Pradesh region. In 1999 Sister Clara, from the local convent, became very concerned about the large group of children living on the platform at the railway station. They eked a living by cleaning shoes, portering, carrying out general errands and selling water. The children were homeless and often just lost. Sister Clara set out to provide a Centre for clothing, food, sanitation, and general care. She called the Centre, 'Jeevodaya' meaning 'hope'.

In 1999 our club member, Jill Joyce, travelled to Itarsi with a group of eccentric tourists lead by Ashley and Jane Butterfield who ran a tourist agency in the Medway Towns. The group were very impressed with Sister Clara's efforts and were determined to help and support her. The charity Jeevodaya has since grown and now runs two hostels, for boys and girls, and still supports the children who prefer platform life with a Day Centre.

Medway and Maidstone Soroptimists have been supporting the charity since 2000. Jill Joyce had been a member of both clubs and wished to raise funds for the charity. A small amount of money goes a long way in India and the Butterfields report annually on the progress of students and staff.

The Garden Party at Abbey Gate Cottages started in 2001 and has been a relaxing afternoon for all concerned and enabled both clubs to mix before their recent amalgamation. This year marks the 20th Garden Party and through the efforts of Sue and Chris Hunt, and the support of members and friends £250 was raised. (Sue, wearing a white top, can be seen in the photo.)

The charity Jeevodaya is going strong with substantial government funding, but the money we contribute through Jane and Ashley Butterfield buys the children holidays, treats and special items such as bicycles.

One of UKPAC's projects over the past few years has been observations on the Special Domestic Abuse Courts in England (Wales had no specific courts at the time of the observations whilst Scotland and Northern Ireland deal with these matters in different ways).

This project is complete, the report has been printed, is now ready for publication and a high profile launch. LBC Radio agreed to run an exclusive on the report, which will feature on the Shelagh Fogarty programme on June 26, and plan to give it a lot of exposure and share it with their sister stations.

Following the broadcast, more information on further media coverage as well as details on accessing the report will be sent out to all members.





CROYDON CLUB WERE delighted to welcome guest speaker Keji Moses to their June speaker meeting.

Keji, a member of SI Canterbury, is the founder and CEO of Mayah's Legacy, a charitable organisation founded in 2020 to empower and educate those affected by pregnancy loss with the tools they need to have their voices heard. She also shared some of the statistics from the 2023 "Saving Babies' Lives" Report, published by Sands and Tommys Joint Policy Unit. The numbers tell a compelling story.

Thank you Keji for highlighting these facts for us, and for the amazing work that you and your team of experts are doing to ensure that expectant and bereaved mothers receive an appropriate quality of care for their specific needs.

Unveiling of Plaque and Recycled Bench at Tree Planting site in Tovil

A PLAQUE AND recycled bench have been installed at Bridge Mill Way, Tovil, to mark the planting of trees and greening of the area by SI Medway and Maidstone.

In January 2022, Club members planted 420 native tree whips in the ex-landfill site area of Bridge Mill Way Recreation Ground in co-operation with the Parks Department of Maidstone Borough Council, to help re-wild the area. Since the planting we have helped maintain the area by carrying out periodic cleanups to help keep the area litter free. It is now a beautiful and peaceful area with lots of wild flowers, enjoyed by residents and dog walkers.

The plaque was unveiled by The Worshipful The Mayor of Maidstone, Cllr Gordon Newton and Regional President Lynne Chiswick on June 03. This is a significant date in our calendar as SI Medway and Maidstone was chartered on June 03, 1946, some 77 years ago.

The former Mayor Cllr Fay Gooch also joined us, proudly wearing a Soroptimist brooch, as she was in office in January 2022 when we planted the whips and was very supportive of the work of Soroptimists to improve the lives of women and girls.

We were pleased that the weather was kind to us and so after the unveiling we were able to enjoy refreshments and snacks prepared by Julia Search. Whilst there we had gone prepared with litter pickers and black bags to do a litter pick but on checking around the area there was very little litter to be found.

In November, we will plant a further 60 tree whips provided by the Woodland Trust. The Council have also agreed to plant an oak tree behind the bench so as it grows it will offer shade.

Jane Barnes wrote to the Maidstone Borough Council's Climate and Biodiversity Department about what the Soroptimists have been doing. She received a positive response from their Engagement Officer, "Thank you for passing on your news story, it is fantastic to hear what your group have achieved in Tovil with assistance from our parks team! I would love to share this story as part of the July newsletter."

Sue is Awarded Certificate of Continued Service



SUE DAYKIN, A member of SI Medway and Maidstone, retired seven years ago from her job as a specialist nurse working with first time teenage parents in Medway.

On June 03, Sue was awarded a Certificate of Continued Service by Holding On Letting Go (HOLG). This was to recognise Sue's incredible 15 years of service as a volunteer to children and families they support. Sue is one of their longest-serving volunteers.

About 16 years ago, HOLG was the club president's charity, and they came in to give a talk. HOLG is a Kent-based charity that helps children to cope with the death of someone close to them. As a children's nurse, Sue thought the work they did was really important, so she wanted to get involved as a volunteer.

After receiving on-going training, Sue has supported children at schools on a one-to-one basis over a six-week period, helped out at the neonatal death groups, with families who have experienced the death of a baby before birth or shortly after. She has also helped at the parent-carer groups too, supporting the lead member of staff.

Sue was asked recently, 'What's your favourite thing about working with HOLG?' She replied, "I just love being with the children. Even though they're there because someone has died, bereavement is not all about sadness; their memories can be happy ones and it's lovely being able to share that with them and have fun. Death doesn't always have to be negative, or about feeling guilty."



The Power of Stories



PRESIDENT LYNNE WAS pleased to welcome Dishi Attwood, SIGBI Director of Membership (both seen above) to our June Regional Meeting. It was Dishi's first visit to the Region, and she welcomed the opportunity to join us for the whole day and hear and understand more about the Region during the morning session.

After lunch Dishi spoke to us about the job of the SIGBI Board which is to ensure that the organisation keeps going. The Board members need to work in partnership with each other, membership is intrinsically linked to Programme Action and PR & Marketing. The Board is currently working on structural issues because of decreasing membership and hence less income. Dishi encouraged members to write to all members of the Board with any questions.

We want to maintain and support our current clubs so that they are there in the future. For some clubs, the message is that it is acceptable to have fewer members and do less Programme Action and they may need help from time to time to be empowered.

Looking to the future, we need to promote that Soroptimist is a network for women. Dishi built her profile on LinkedIn then started attending business network meetings. Personal contact brings members, it is important to get to know people and for them to know you, then you can invite them to join. 'Put yourself out there' and talk to people.

Dishi spoke about work that has been undertaken recently to streamline the process for setting up clubs and this is available on the Hub.

We need to recruit to the Soroptimist brand and not specific geographical clubs. We need to get the message out, stop talking to and amongst ourselves as if in an echo chamber. Our Soroptimist brand includes our membership of the UN which is special. Find a project on the Hub that appeals to you and use that as a story to tell people.

If you think of the 'Elevator pitch' – you need something that connects to people. Listen to what interests them and speak about a relevant project. Remember to use the TEEN approach:

Top line: own and recognise what is good. I am a

Soroptimist because 'It gives me a warm glow'.

- Example: find your own story about why it makes you feel good.
- Emotional aspect: find an interesting fact to share, did you know...
- Next: what next, invite them to come to a club meeting or for coffee.

There was certainly food for thought for all members to think about to secure the future of our clubs, Region and the organisation as a whole to ensure we continue to make a difference to improve the lives of women and girls.
