Val sleeps out for Bromley Homeless

SI BROMLEY IS very proud of Val Carrier who slept out overnight to raise support for Bromley Homeless. It was a cold and windy night and members thought of ringing her to say "Stay inside and we will still support you", but she braved it out and raised over £12,000 in sponsorship.

Val wrote an account of her adventure and her are some extracts:

"The evening started with a curry meal that the Mayor and Mayoress attended. At about 21:30 the guests left. The sleepers sought out their slots. I chose a place on the path next to the wall of the hall as someone had recommended sleeping next to a wall or in front of a gravestone – no choice!

"The thunder and lightning passed but the rain persisted. I lay in my sleeping bag as snug as a bug in a rug, but the ground was hard, the rain was now pouring down; the graveyard was eerie and sleep would not come. What was I doing here? I was here raising money for people who have fallen on hard times, often through no fault of their own, and just sink into the mire unless a charity can help them. What was one night of discomfort?

"The highlight of the night was when I woke up and the sky was the most beautiful I have ever seen, bright blue with ribbon clouds streaming through it and the full moon shining down brightly on me.



"When I woke and went inside, the cup of tea and bacon butty were most welcome. Then I went home to a warm bed under a good roof". Well done, Val.

Women in Revolt!

ART AND ACTIVISM IN THE UK 1970-1990



THIS IS THE title of a new exhibition at TATE BRITIAN which is on until April 07, 2024. Fifty years on from when women first had the vote in the UK, sees the first Women's Liberation conference in 1970 and the men ran the creche for the children.

This exhibition is the first of its kind. It includes art from over 100 women artists working in the UK. It explores how networks of women used radical ideas and rebellious methods to make an invaluable contribution to women's liberation and how this was achieved against a backdrop of social, economic and political change.

The multi-media exhibition showcases the lived experiences from a very diverse range of women. It includes subjects like Punk, Greenham Common, Art by Post and more, bringing the challenges of being heard up to date with Race, Disability and LGBTQ+.

Personally speaking, I can't say I enjoyed it, but it is certainly an interesting exhibition, a commentary on how things have changed. If you get a chance to go, I'd be interested to hear what you thought of it.

Launch of Safer Internet Day poster competition at Orange Cafe



DURING 2022 TUNBRIDGE Wells club produced a report 'Spotlight on Safety' which dealt with the issue of how safe women and girls feel out and about in our local community. This formed part of our work on SDG5: Gender Equality and the issue of Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG). As a follow up to this the club has launched a poster competition inspired by the annual 'Safer Internet Day' scheduled for February 14, 2024. The competition, aimed at 11-18-year-olds, is designed to get young people thinking about how to be safer on the internet, as well as aware of what they post and the potential harm it can do to others.

In line with the worldwide VAWG theme of "oranging the world" we launched the competition at our "Orange Café" in the foyer of Trinity Theatre, Tunbridge Wells on Novemer 25, day one of the UN 16 days of activism against gender-based violence.

Through this competition we hope to raise awareness of the shadow cast on society by the high incidence of VAWG and hopefully encourage young men to think about, and be aware of, their potential role in it. Protection from Sex Based Harassment in Public becomes a law

A JOURNEY WHICH started in October 2021 became a Law of the Land in September 19, 2023. It is amazing what dedicated club members and partnership working can achieve.

A Survey was carried out by club members after a young lady was attacked on the common in Tunbridge Wells. The attack happened the day before our 75th Birthday which incensed us.

Having analysed our survey and produced a Spotlight on Safety report we then contacted our Local MP. Working with us were Plan International and our local Reclaim the Street group. Our MP was lucky to be picked for a Friday Private Members Bill.

So, on Friday, December 09, 2022 a few of the club members were in the Public Gallery at the House of Commons to hear the third reading of the Bill, supported by all Political Parties.

Having then travelled its way both to the House of Lords and the Commons all that was left was for the bill to receive Royal Assent. This happened on September 19, 2023.

Soroptimist International is now in Hansard the official record in print form of proceedings in the House of Commons and will be there for evermore. A truly remarkable achievement for our club and something every Soroptimist in every club should be shouting from the rooftops .

Climate for Change

Two days of learning and listening to inspirational speakers. Welcoming countries belonging to the federation with their opening Parade of Flags. This is always moving as you realise you really do belong to a global women's organisation. Two days of making new and renewing old friendships. A joy to do so. The theme of the conference focused on:

• Reconnecting with the Planet: ensuring that the future generations are introduced to the planet from a very early age. Speaker: Monty Halls, British Marine Biologist, Broadcaster, Author well known for his Great Escape series.

• Elimination of Violence against Women: Speakers: Louisa Rolfe Assistant Commissioner Met. Police, Hasina Safi, former Afghan government minister for women's affairs, Divya Arya, Women's affairs reporter, BBC news Delhi, India

• Microfinancing Lend with Care: Tracey Horner, Head of Individual Giving for care International UK.

All speakers spoke passionately about their subjects, Monty Halls, held the audience in the palm of his hand as he took us through his expeditions particularly to the Galapagos islands where he lived with his young family introducing and connecting them to the ocean and its teeming life. Not only did he emphasise the importance of connecting children with coastal life but with nature in all its aspects eg, primary schools having gardens and access to woodlands.

Tracey Horner gave a succinct exposition of the Lend It with Care scheme which provides life changing loans to small business owners in low-income countries from Pakistan to Malawi

Elimination of Violence against Women

This was the most powerful session of the conference. Louisa Rolfe, Metropolitan Police, started by apologising for the 'rogue' police officers who had abused their power by preying on women and then addressing the robust police response. There was acknowledgement from her and the many questions from the floor that the dynamics of domestic abuse is highly complicated. The current situation of reporting this type of abuse does not encourage victims to seek redress. Hasina Rafi spoke with passion about the plight of women in Afghanistan. She spoke movingly about the strides women had made in the interlude between Taliban regimes only to be plunged into darkness again. She could not over emphasise the need for solidarity of women globally in supporting their Afghan sisters. There was a standing 500 women ovation at the end of her presentation.

Equally Divya Arya spoke with great passion about the muchpublicised Gang Rape cases which shocked India. She was involved in the reporting of these crimes and how it had destroyed the victims' lives due to fear. Her main message to conference was the need to use education in order to change cultural attitudes.

Programme Action Sessions

Listening to stories of the chosen best practice awards is always impressive. Here is a sample of the 10 entries submitted:

- SI Madurai: Anaemia Awareness Campaign.
- SI Newtown: Mammogram campaign.
- SI Bombay Chembur: Eco Empowerment, Say No to Plastics.

• Delegates' winner was SI Barnstaple and District: Anti Spiking Campaign.

Modernisation Proposals

Board members gave a brief update. 430 responses had been received and all read. It is the first stage of a genuine consultation with every member a stakeholder. A list of FAQs will be circulated. There will be four meetings online in December. Emphasised these are constitutional changes which would need to be debated. A revised document will be published in mid January 2024 with ensuing resolution by end of April 2024 to be presented at AGM 2024. There was clarification that both individual members' and club responses were acceptable at this stage of the consultation.

Next year's conference is in Edinburgh and I do encourage members to have the federation conference experience as it really brings alive our work when put in the global context.

PS there was a strong plea throughout conference for Programme Action Report Forms [PFRFs] to be completed!!

Tree Planting at Tovil



SIX MEMBERS OF SI Medway and Maidstone (Carol, Jane, Julia, Sharon and Stella), plus a Soroptimister, returned to the former landfill site at Tovil on Saturday, November 25. This was where we planted 420 tree whips in January 2021 and returned the following year to install a bench and commemorative plaque.

We were equipped with spades and wearing Hi-Viz vests ready to do some tree planting. Although the weather was cold, the sky was blue and dry this time, very different to the damp fog in 2021.

We were aware that a significant number of the 420 trees planted in January 2021 had not survived the extreme hot weather conditions that summer.

Sharon Forghani had ordered 60 tree whips from the Woodland Trust to replace those that had not survived. These whips are provided free to community groups such as Soroptimist clubs. There were a variety of native species including dog rose, hawthorn, hazel, crab apple, dogwood, silver birch, rowan and wild cherry.

The UK needs millions more trees to reach its 2050 carbon net zero target. By digging in with the Woodland Trust, we are helping to achieve this important goal.

On arrival we could see that Maidstone Borough Council had cut down all the overgrown foliage in the wildlife area so we could do the tree planting more easily. Unfortunately, this action had resulted in further damage to the original tree whips. Before we started any further planting we set about locating as many of the tree whips and ensuring they were supported with canes.

After a productive morning planting the 60 new tree whips, we marked the whips on the perimeters using the green packaging to identify them more easily. A commitment was made to return to the site and take responsibility in future for cutting the area in between the whips ourselves and not rely on the council contractors.

We have been lucky to have Valerie Caton in our club; until recently she was a trustee of CAMFED and has always given us regular updates about the work of this wonderful charity. We were delighted to hear that the highly influential commentator Nicholas Kristof and the New York Times have just made CAMFED their top recommended non-profit to support.

Below is a photo from a visit Valerie made to Tanzania in 2014 to meet CAMFED Alumni and to see some of the rural schools where CAMFED operates. Here she meets a Mother and Father Support Group who have been making nourishing meals for primary school children supported by CAMFED. They have grown their own cereals and made porridge to give the children a nourishing lunch to keep them happy in school and able to concentrate on learning. Valerie is at the back on the far left and next to her at the front is Ann Cotton, who founded CAMFED in 1992, was its President until a few years ago, and is now a Trustee/Board Member. The current CEO (since January 2023) is Angeline Murimirwa.

In addition to period products, I was able to buy a huge amount of general, everyday basic hygiene products like shower gel, shampoo/conditioner, deodorant and dental products. So, once again, a huge thank you to you and your organisation for helping THB Maidstone support those amongst us who are in such need of these products!

Everyone deserves to feel clean!" Emma from The Hygiene Bank Medway said, "The delivery has arrived. I have



attached a picture and a thank you certificate for you. We managed to buy an amazing amount of sanitary towels and period pants with your generous donation and I know it will help many women and girls in the area.
