Changing the lives of young people in Kenya

Sponsorship Programme



When I first visited Kenya in 2016 one memory that will remain with me is the broad smile of a small child when I gave him a pencil. His very own pencil. It struck me to the core and made me really appreciate the education and opportunities that I have had in the UK. If parents can't afford to buy some sort of uniform for their child they cannot go to school. Even though education is free parents must pay for uniforms, exam fees and books.

For many children in Kenya life can be very difficult. Children don't get enough food to eat, and often go hungry. If they go to school they get fed in the morning and at lunchtime, so it's a bit of a vicious circle for parents – send their children to school so they get fed, but then they have to pay for uniform etc, or keep them at home helping with chores and supporting the family – fetching water, looking after younger siblings, herding cattle and goats to pasture. For some it is not even an option – they just can't afford any sort of uniform. Some children will just drop out from school.

Amuka Foundation works with three schools in the Karare town area in Northern Kenya and has a very good working relationship with the headteachers. The children most in need of sponsorship are identified by the headteachers and Amuka can then link them with a donor.

Compared to other charities the monthly donation (£15) is a much smaller amount. That is because we do not have any admin costs associated with it. 100% of that £15 goes towards the child's schooling and his/her family. It immediately provides the child with school uniform, school shoes, pays the school fees and the family receives a food parcel. The donation covers exam fees and textbooks and, very importantly, covers health insurance for the whole family.


We hold 'sponsored children days' three times a year and try to coincide that with any visitors to Kenya. The children are given donations of clothing and toiletries and are provided with refreshments. On production of their end of term report their parent/guardian is given a food voucher which can be exchanged for food staples at one of three women-led businesses in Karare.




One of the woman owned shops providing staples in exchange for a voucher.

111 Years Forward: Celebrating the Legacy of the Great Suffrage Pilgrimage







Soroptimists – Following in the footsteps of Vera Conway-Gordon







DURING OCTOBER, ROCHESTER'S smallest art gallery, the Medway Art Box, proudly hosted a new exhibition presented by the 111 Years Forward Project. This creative display commemorates the 111th anniversary of the Great Suffrage Pilgrimage of 1913, when approximately 50,000 women marched from across the country, converging in Hyde Park to demand the right to vote.

The exhibition aims to capture the significance of the pilgrimage, celebrating both the collective achievement and the individual journeys that shaped this historic event. A central feature is the recreation of an original women's suffrage banner, expertly crafted with guidance from Dr Gillian Murphy of the London School of Economics Women's Library. The display also includes replicas of historic literature, photographs, and artefacts, offering a glimpse into the lives of the women who paved the way for equality.

The 111 Years Forward Project team invited people of all ages to contribute decorated footprints for the exhibition and this included Medway and Maidstone Soroptimists.

Wanda Wright painted two footprints as our contribution and labelled them, 'Medway and Maidstone Soroptimists Following in the Footsteps of Vera Conway-Gordon 1874-1955'.

Many of the footprints have been paired with the names of real women's suffrage campaigners who participated in the 1913 pilgrimage, including Rochester's own Vera Conway-Gordon, who led fellow pilgrims through the High Street to a service at the Cathedral.

We chose Vera as Soroptimists have been volunteering at the Suffrage Sensory Garden on the Esplanade, just a short walk from the Art Box, in tribute to Vera Conway-Gordon's legacy.

Jennifer Godfrey, author of Suffragettes of Kent, commented: "We are incredibly grateful to Medway Art Box, LSE Women's Library, Friends of Rochester Churchfields and Esplanade, Medway Libraries, and all those who contributed footprints and shared their support on social media. This collaboration has been such a rewarding experience for us, and we deeply appreciate everyone's involvement."

Letter Writing to Support Project Hope

PROJECT HOPE IS SATEDA'S letter writing initiative which aims to combat isolation among women in UK prisons, where two in three women are domestic abuse survivors.

It can be done anywhere, takes little time, and makes a massive difference.

Launched in summer 2020, when they found out that the Covid pandemic meant prisoners were being kept in their cells for 23 hours a day and going without family visits, Project Hope was the brainchild of a SATEDA volunteer who was herself locked up because of her abusive ex-partner.

Volunteers write encouraging letters, cards and poems that let women behind bars know that someone is thinking about them, and they are not alone.

Every year Project Hope sends over 2,000 messages of hope to four women's prisons across the UK, giving recipients the option of starting some correspondence. Our writers use only their first name, or a pen name, and all letters exchanged go through Project Hope.

Medway and Maidstone Soroptimists have been supporting this initiative since 2021. At our October club meeting members brought in cards to write during the meeting suitable for the holiday period in December. Fifty cards were written with encouraging messages such as, 'Strong women are not simply born; they are forged through the challenges of life. With each challenge we grow mentally and emotionally.'

This was one of the actions as part of our commitment to support the '16 Days of Action' in November to end violence against women.

One of our newer members, Mel Dann Adamson, kindly volunteered to deliver the cards to Project Hope. She can be seen delivering the cards to Valerie Williams of Project Hope.

Fundraising success enables sponsorship for Nour

MANY, MANY THANKS to everyone who supported my regional project – sponsoring a year's salary for Nour, the speech and language therapist based in the rehabilitation centre of a Palestinian refugee camp, Deir Ammar. Not only did we raise £4751, but also a great deal of awareness about ABCD's work in the West Bank. I have been given the opportunity to share a regularly updated presentation with almost all the region clubs.

To give further context, Nour is working with up to 35 students a month. The majority of her pupils have learning difficulties but there are also a few cases of Down's syndrome, cerebral palsy ,and one or two have cognitive speech delay. The majority are aged between 1-6, followed by 7-12 and then 12-16. The rehabilitation centre is working closely with the local schools to encourage students to join the normal educational system. It will come as no surprise to learn that Nour has a waiting list but without an increase in her hours, she can work with only the most needy cases.

The head of Deir Ammar rehabilitation centre, Rabab Azmi, states "I am grateful to the Soroptimists group for establishing the speech and language service, it gave hope and an enlightenment to children with learning difficulties to engage with schooling and local community as therapy did improve their speech and social skills"

Nour herself says "I am extremely delighted to be working with children with learning and cognitive disabilities to support and help them develop their skills and their engagement with day to day activities of daily living. Thank you Soroptimists for giving me such an opportunity".

And that's a big thank you from me too.

Soroptimists fill 60 Shoeboxes for Christmas Appeal











Soroptimists Supporting Blythswood Christmas Shoebox Appeal





MEMBERS OF SI MEDWAY and Maidstone have been busy preparing for this year's Christmas Shoebox Appeal. We set ourselves a target to fill 60 shoeboxes, focusing on women and girls aged 10 years plus.

Some of the essential items for each shoebox include a hat, scarf, and gloves. Two members took on the task to knit 60 sets of these throughout the year in time for the shoebox filling.

Other members donated monies to purchase practical items such as toothpaste, toothbrushes, soap, flannels, shower gel, notepads, pens, pencils, sanitary products, underwear, socks, small toys, gifts, sweets, candles, and household items.

A supply of 60 empty shoeboxes were provided by a local shoe stockist and then wrapped in advance ready to be filled.

Angela Howe kindly agreed to host the team of five volunteers at her home on the evening of October 23, providing us with a meal before we started filling the boxes. It took us about two hours to fill the 60 shoeboxes and label them with what was inside and the gender and age of the intended recipient.

After a successful evening, the 60 shoeboxes were loaded up and taken the next day to the Collection Point in Gillingham.

They will be checked by volunteers before being transported to people affected by the war in Ukraine in time for Christmas.

The individually wrapped boxes will be distributed in schools, hospitals, orphanages, and care homes, and to households in very low-income communities.

UK Parliament Outreach for Maidstone and Medway Soroptimists International

This will be at 19:30 on November 26 and fortuitously follows UK Parliament Week (November 18-24). Kerrie Carpenter, Senior Education and Engagement Officer for SE England will talk to us, amongst other things, about:

- * how Parliament works;
- * how to open the doors to Parliament and get our voices heard;
- * what are Select Committees and how do they work;
- * how do laws get made;
- * how can the public get involved;
- * how we can use it to our best advantage.

Since Soroptimists started out as a campaigning organisation it seems important for us to know how to navigate Parliament and learn how to use it to make a difference to women and girls. Kerrie has assured me that it will be a lively and engaging session and, having spoken to her I am sure that that will be the case. She knows all about Soroptimists and she and her team have spoken to different Soroptimist regions in the past.
