The Eastbourne club have been supporting the women's refuge for many years and we are always looking for new ways to support the ladies. The refuge asked for dressing gowns we were a little surprised in the summer but we were told after the ladies have put the children to bed they like to have a shower and curl up in a warm fluffy dressing gown to read a book or watch TV.

This sounded like a really nice idea and the task of finding 9 dressing gowns begun. After visiting several shops we discovered it is the wrong time of year to buy cosy dressing gowns. It is all summer stock and toweling bath and beach robes not what we want-



ed. One of the members donated a dressing gown with stars on and I found one in a high class charity shop while on holiday with suns and moons on and bought a cord belt in Dunelm to go with it. One of the members looked on the internet and found some lovely dressing gowns in the Asda George sale so we ended up with a collection of different sizes and colours for the ladies to choose.

The dressing gowns were delivered to the refuge and greatly appreciated with a cost of just over £100 for all 9!. The money was taken from President Lotte past president's fund having raised the money at several fund raising events.

When we delivered the dressing gowns we asked if there was anything else they would like. At present they have 12 children at the refuge, aged 5 to 12. This is quite unusual and it seems they all get on very well and the summer holidays are coming up so they asked for some outdoor play equipment. We were shown the garden there were a selection of bikes and a seesaw but not much to actually play games with so another challenge faced us!



Two members of the club visited the Range and came back with a huge selection of bats, balls, skipping ropes, hoops, play tunnels and outside games. There is a picture of Pat with the equipment they bought. So another £150 was spent and the children of the refuge will enjoy their summer holidays playing together.

At Christmas time we will provide a bag of toiletries for the ladies as many organisations give gifts for the children and we will keep in contact to see if there is anything else they need. We really feel helping the refuge is improving the lives of these women and their children.

Women's Grassroots Activism Podcast Series

Soroptimist Tunbridge Wells are delighted and honoured to receive this certificate from Soroptimist International with the campaign, launched in 2008 to end violence against women following message 'Your Club's outstanding project, "Grassroots Activism Podcast Series" has been selected as an exemplary initiative and included in SI's our HLPF 2025 Report.'



Grassroots activism is rooted in the belief that lasting change comes from the ground up. By organising at a local level, women can create networks of solidarity, built coalitions and work toward long-term solutions that align with the real needs of their communities. Sharing stories is an important element of this work.

SITWD has continued its collaboration on the important academic research project into Women's Grassroots Activism. The podcast series is funded by the United Kingdom Research Innovation (UKRI) Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC) as part of the grant awarded for Agency and Advocacy: Locating Women's Grassroots Activism in England and Ireland, 1918 to the present (Project Reference: AH/ X008606/1, August 2023 - January 2025). The research team is made up of Principal Investigator Professor Caitríona Beaumont (London South Bank University and Visiting Full Professor at University College Dublin), Co-Investigator is Dr Anne Logan (University of Kent), Dr Ruth Davidson (Institute of Historical Research, University of London), Dr Anna Muggeridge (University of Worcester) and Rachel Collett (University of Liverpool).

This podcast series tells stories of women's grassroots activism across the island of Ireland and in England from 1918 to the present. This stage saw a production of a podcast series which highlight the diverse ways that various women's organisations, including Soroptimist Tunbridge Wells & District, and SIGBI contribute to enhancing the lives of women and girls locally, nationally and globally.

Episode 3

Women's Grassroots Activism: SIGBI campaigns and educational work against gender-based violence In this episode, Dr Ruth Davidson, Caroline Auckland, former President of the Tunbridge Wells and District Soroptimists Club, Kent, and Eadaoin Lawlor, national past President of Soroptimists Republic of Ireland discuss how Soroptimists have campaigned to end Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG). We consider the ways this work is achieved through advocacy and campaigns around policy and education at local, national and global levels. We also discuss campaigns including the 'Safe Home Safe Community Project' and how

SIGBI supports the United Nations 'Orange the World' and girls.

Episode 3 Women's Grassroots Activism: SIGBI campaigns and educational work against gender-based violence

Episode 4 -Women's Grassroots Activism: stories of environmental activism

In this episode, Dr Anne Logan, Chrissie Booth, Vice-Chair of the National Federation of Women's Institutes (NFWI), and Lorna Blackmore, past regional President of the Soroptimist International Great Britain and Ireland (SIGBI) Southeast Region, discuss the myriad ways in which women's organisations have campaigned, and continue to campaign, to protect and improve the natural environment. Topics we discuss include the formation of the iconic 'Keep Britain Tidy' campaign by the NFWI in 1954 and the current NFWI campaign for 'clean rivers for people and wildlife'. We also discuss SIGBI support for 'toilet twinning' and for solarpowered cooking devices to reduce deforestation and hopes for a future less dependent upon single-use plastic items.

Episode 4 Women's Grassroots Activism: stories of environmental activism

Understanding and acknowledging women's contributions can help shift cultural norms that have historically sidelined or undervalued women's roles. It helps promote gender equality and ensures that everyone, regardless of gender, is treated fairly and with respect, By acknowledging the impact women have, we move closer to eliminating systemic discrimination and ensuring equal opportunities for all.

We enjoyed working with other women's organisations by using the podcast as a method of demonstrating

The conversational format makes for a more in-depth informative listen and has more permanence in a social media bite-size driven world of communication.

A group of 15 members and friends of SI Medway and Maidstone visited the Medway SIM Suite at Canterbury Christ Church University on 13 August for a talk and tour. Our mission was to find out how AI is being used in the health field.

'Medbury' hospital is fully kitted out and open all year round to be used for training and development of healthcare and associated professionals. A one-day simulation exercise for Junior doctors using mannequins and actors was held, to experience a wide range of real-life scenarios resulted in high levels o sickness being reduced to zero and increased confidence with improved patient experience. The opportunity to use and practice using highly sophisticated equipment on realistic simulators with portfolio of improvement reports available on-line for individuals Also working with 200 schools to attract 100,000 young adults into working in the healthcare field.


