No Girl Should Miss School - the Rowena Period










Pots and bedding for Sevenoaks Women's Refuge

Sevenoaks Soroptimist Explore Pearly Kings

Sevenoaks Soroptimists and visitors from SI Tunbridge Wells and SI East Grinstead were treated to an upbeat and amusing history of the Pearly Kings and Queens by Chris Conlan and his own journey into becoming the Pearly King of Bromley. Over £100 was raised at the meeting which was given to Chris for his charities. He is a member of the Pearly Kings and Queens Society who support a plethora of London charities. Chris is also the Town Crier for Sevenoaks supporting the mayor, councillors and local charities at events in the town. He has been honoured with a British citizen award for Services to the Community (BCAc). He collected his award from Matt Allwright and Karen Featherstone.

The first Pearly King was Henry Croft, born in 1861 an orphan in the workhouse and street sweeper who

started the tradition in the late 19th century to raise money for charities. He covered his suit with mother-of-pearl buttons to stand out and attract attention, which was so successful he inspired others to do the same, creating the Pearly Kings and Queens tradition.

Pearly Kings and Queens are a charitable group of workingclass Londoners who raise money for various causes, identifiable by their ornate suits, hats, and shoes covered in mother-of-pearl buttons. The tradition started in the 19th century with costermongers (street traders) who began decorating their clothes with buttons as a status symbol and for charity collection, evolving into a structured society thanks to Henry Croft.

Women's Aid 'End Domestic Abuse: Building a brighter future'

The sale of the Orange knitted flower brooches at the Regional AGM and at other Orange themed events raised £125.

This money has been paid in to attract the Big Give match funding plus gift aid. This means the Women's Aid charity - End Domestic Abuse -

Medway and Maidstone Soroptimists donate to The Hygiene Bank

In October it was National Hygiene Week from 6-12 October 2025, to raise awareness about hygiene poverty.

Did you know?

8.7 million Brits have missed a job interview or a day at work because they could not afford hygiene products. One car repair. One lost job. One unexpected bill. That is all it takes for millions of UK adults to be pulled into hygiene poverty and many of us are struggling with these stresses alone.

And the consequences can have long-lasting implications, people avoid going to work or to job interviews, and they severely reduce and limit their social interactions. Hygiene poverty limits access to education, work and to routes out of poverty, yet research shows that over 1 in 5 people in the UK do not know what hygiene poverty is.

The Hygiene Bank highlighted this crisis by creating yellow moments that cannot be ignored. Buildings and landmarks

nationwide were

illuminated in bright yellow to draw attention to the millions who cannot afford everyday hygiene basics.

What did we do?

Medway and Maidstone Soroptimists are supporters of the Medway Hygiene Bank. At our October club meeting, we brought donated hygiene products such as shower gel, which were needed. These were delivered to one of their collection points in Medway

during National Hygiene Week and the donated items weighed 37.1kg.
