Soroptimist International's Response to Racism

SI have written an open letter in response to the Black Lives Matter campaign. Here is an extract: -

Dear Friends and Colleagues,

From our humble beginning in October 1921 until today, Soroptimist International (SI) was founded on the principles of human rights, social & economic justice, equality, peace, and international goodwill and to transform the lives of girls and women of all ages through our international partnerships and our global network of members. The world is being ravaged by COVID-19, the worst pandemic in 100 years and global deaths continue to rise and unfortunately, the black, brown and indigenous communities have been the hardest hit.

Observing senseless acts of racism as well as blatant violence against peaceful demonstrators and attacks against the Press, we are saddened and disheartened. As an organisation we strongly believe in Freedom of Speech and Peaceful Assembly that are fundamental rights in the UN Declaration of Human Rights.

We stand in solidarity with people of colour and all who are equally outraged by these longstanding injustices. We are determined that there needs to be anti-racist action now and that we can no longer remain silent or try to invalidate or dismiss racism in any form. We must all take responsibility for our own actions. We must speak out and be proactive to end racism, indifference, and hatred and to ensure "we leave no one behind".

SI LIVERPOOL - WoW Bags and Buckets Delivered Just in Time & a Little Light Relief

The Healthcare group met in February to begin putting together over fifty 'WoW bags, so named after the 'Women of Whitechapel'. These bags are designed to add a little more luxury into the lives of women, who make up about 30% of clients who rely on the day to day services offered by the Whitechapel Centre for the homeless in Liverpool.

Whilst people generously donate toiletries, it's often the extras that can make you feel better about yourself. So, our bags were more like a make-up bag, with hair accessories, make-up remover pads, eye-shadow, nail varnish and varnish remover, tissues and even false eyelashes! We also included a little inspirational message to help lift the spirits of the women.

Jackie, the Centre Support manager, was delighted to receive the first batch of bags. Little did we realise how timely they were as the lockdown started 10 days later! Also, a timely gift were five buckets with cleaning aids inside for anyone moving into accommodation. As everyone since then has been moved into temporary accommodation for the duration of the lockdown, these would still be a very useful gift indeed!







In response to a request from members to support, in particular, women who are in police custody, Copy Lane Custody Officer Kate Arnold asked club members if we could supply appropriate reading material for those being held in police cells.

At weekends, sometimes women are brought in because of domestic violence or having been trafficked, but they have to wait until Monday morning for the courts to open. Not only do those in custody get bored but they can distract the police just to pass the time! These magazines and light reading books were very gratefully received. A special thanks to club member Rasa, who with the help of friends, supplied much needed eastern European reading materials. An article was published by Kate on an internal police memo, acknowledging our support for their work. Some magazines also went to Whitechapel for the Polish community there.



SI Crosby didn't let the lockdown stop them from celebrating the club's 82nd Birthday and marking the occasion by raising much needed funds for Sefton Women's and Children's Aid, a local charity helping women, young people and children survive the impact of Domestic Violence and Abuse.





Sponsors were able to donate to a fundraising page for the event through the 'Give as you Live' fundraising platform. A link to the fundraising page was shared using social and other media.

The event engaged members and their supporters, raised £2,284 plus £472 Gift Aid and increased awareness of SWACA at a time when there is significant evidence that domestic abuse affecting women and children is rising as a result of the COVID-19 crisis.

SI Crosby members enjoyed the event and their individual challenges across a wide range of activities achieved a total distance of over 202 miles. Activities included cycling, walking, Zumba, Hula-hooping, Tai-chi, a Bakeathon and a Harpathon!
