SI LIVERPOOL - Freedom of the City



The Freedom Bus came to Liverpool in December to raise awareness of Human Trafficking in the city. The bus, which has the Modern Slavery Helpline number on each side, was organised by club member Annette Maud who works for Liverpool Stop the Traffik, in partnership with The Merseyside Police Crime Commissioner. The initiative is also Club President Anne's chosen charity for this year.

The bus drove around the city, stopping outside places such as car washes and massage parlours and visited the Anglican Cathedral, International Slavery Museum, the Town Hall and Liverpool John Lennon Airport. Police and Mersey fire officers were on the bus to assist with any reports received.

The journey was filmed by BBC news and was featured on North West Tonight that very evening. A very successful partnership and event for the city.







Our International Event included a collection of readings and a talk about the role of women in the writing of the Human Rights Act. Candles were lit for all Soroptimists in the Region.

It was an extremely enjoyable and informative event which was preceded by a Christmas poem, Christmas quizzes and even a Christmas sing a long!

S. I. Bootle and District are fortunate enough to have amongst their members, three who work with, and supply support to, victims of domestic violence, rape and sexual assault. They deliver training, and lecturing in all aspects of abuse including FGM.

A member working with vulnerable women organised a number of meetings and training sessions using zoom via RASA. They were drop-in sessions, aimed at both service users and professionals, and were both educational and informative.

Bootle Baby Bank

This organisation helps young mothers who are finding it difficult, especially during these challenging times and responds to requests from social workers for baby items.

Members make donations of nappies, baby wipes, baby milk formula and children's clothing.

These items need constant replacement and some are now appearing to be in short supply, so every donation is extremely welcomed.



International Presidents Appeal - "The Road to Equality"

The club held their International Night via zoom and hosted members, past and present along with Friendship link club members from SI Morecambe and SI Heysham. Drinks, nibbles etc were BYO! A candle lighting ceremony preceded a reading of the Declaration of Human Rights.

There was music, carols, quizzes and prizes (posted in time for Christmas), sharing of poems, readings, anecdotes and plenty of time for chatting and sharing ideas. Feedback from guest clubs was extremely generous, and showed what can be done under trying circumstances.

Lockdown can make it difficult to arrange fundraising events with often only the use of Zoom, so SI Bolton decided to have a game of Call my Bluff.


This proved to be an interesting evening grappling with a list of odd, unknown words. Three willing volunteers each read out one of a choice of three definitions, all sounding extremely plausible.

Domestic Violence Project



Waterloo Primary School – A 'chance encounter' and a subsequent Zoom meeting with the headteacher revealed the school's educational and social challenges during the pandemic. Members immediately resolved to fund a number of laptops to support children' home learning.

Knit for Peace – Members are knitting and crocheting squares, sewing them together, and adding a neat border. It's a team effort! The first two blankets are now completed.

Age Concern – Five members are now phone 'buddies' for lonely clients of the charity. Members packed 70 seasonal hampers with Age Concern's goodies and included a gift card on behalf of Crosby's Soroptimists.



Whitechapel Centre, Liverpool – We donated toiletries for homeless people; also proceeds of our Christmas raffle; three baskets of luxury goodies, the contents of which were purchased by members of our Exec Team.

South Sefton Foodbank – One member has been able to continue as a volunteer during the pandemic. Members are therefore able to pass food donations via her. A special Christmas effort included toiletries and household items for the clients.
