

# **Farewell to Margaret Tye**



Margaret, a Warrington Soroptimist for more than 50 years, passed away in November after a long battle with cancer. Alongside her career as a Tutor-Librarian specialising in children's literature, she was an award-winning crafter, quilter, and amateur painter.

An acknowledged expert on Alice in Wonderland, Margaret was Secretary of the Daresbury Lewis Carroll Society and loaned items from her impressive collection of Alice memorabilia to the Society's Museum.

Margaret presided as Chair of the Warrington Arts Council for 50 years, since its creation. This volunteer-run organisation was set up to promote the cultural life of the town.

Margaret will be much missed for her indomitable spirit and continuous contribution to the Club, of which she was President four times, and was made an Honorary Member in recognition of her long service.

#### SI WARRINGTON - A Tudor Night in Style

Anna Alexander, volunteer guide at Liverpool's Speke Hall, gave us a fascinating talk about the Elizabethan origins of this National Trust property and turned up in full Elizabethan costume!

Speke Hall was built in the middle of the 1500's by the Norris family. While its interior was extensively remodelled in Victorian times, there are parts of the house which still retain original Tudor features. Anna talked us through these and how they reflect the challenges the Norris family faced as Catholics in a Protestant age. One room was thought to have been a Chapel and we learned about the Priest Hole where a visiting cleric could be hidden in the event of priest-hunters visiting! There is also the Eavesdropping space in the roof, where servants could listen to visitors talking below outside the front door and judge whether they were safe to invite in.

#### Stop the Traffik March – Liverpool, 15 October 2022



President Rhona represented SI Warrington at the annual demonstration against human Trafficking on the Liverpool quayside. Whilst there, she visited the International Slavery Museum to see a moving exhibition of Freedom Quilts, produced by survivors of human trafficking.

They are supported by the Sophie Hayes Foundation, who was herself a victim of modern-day slavery. Each of the 247 squares in the quilts, made with Liberty fabrics, represent the survivor's past and hopes and dreams for the future.






Four members of SI Widnes attended the Federation Conference in Belfast. These pictures are from the change of Insignia, when our member, Denise Parker, became Regional President.

## **SI WIDNES - Programme Action**

PAUSE is a project to help women whose children have been taken away from them and put into care. This often involves several children. PAUSE advocates taking precautions to avoid pregnancy for a period of 18 months in order to break the cycle. Women are offered opportunities to improve themselves and develop new skills – aimed at preventing further children being taken into care. SI Clubs are encouraged to get involved to offer support to the women to show them that someone cares.

The club donated a number of "hugs in a mug" using China mugs left over from our 75th anniversary, containing a bag filled with chocolates and a logo card with our good wishes for Christmas. The mugs were presented to PAUSE organisers during a joint PAC evening with SI St Helens, SI Warrington and SI Runcorn, hosted by SI Widnes on 22nd November.

#### KINGS CROSS PROJECT CARE LEAVERS

We were asked for non-essential/luxury items for 30 care leavers. The club had agreed a budget of £150 and 30 reusable Christmas bags were purchased and 30 tubs of chocolates which will be delivered to the Kings Cross Project for them to pass on.

#### LIVERPOOL WOMEN'S HOSPITAL

Over the last 2 years, the Club has supported a project to provide clothing for women who have experienced a miscarriage. In order to avoid women having to leave hospital in soiled clothing, nurses had been providing pyjamas or leggings to the women but this had become onerous. The support for the project was substantial and the project has now evolved into providing dignity bags and baby starter bags for vulnerable women attending hospital with no provisions for their expected babies.
