

SI WARRINGTON DELIVERING DIGNITY

You are rushed to hospital, it's an emergency admission, you have absolutely nothing with you and yet you are waiting in A&E, sometimes for hours. You need a minimum of personal items to help you through the wait, things that might only be provided once you are on a ward.

One of our members has recent experience of both a relative and a friend being admitted in such circumstances and came up with the idea of providing Warrington General Hospital's A&E Department with **Patient Hospital Dignity Bags**, which contain the following items:

A small supply of tissues in a wipeable cover.

• A pen and paper for writing information/questions to share with either medical staff or visiting relatives.

- A small Toothbrush with tube of Toothpaste.
- A Denture pot with single denture tablet for storing teeth (could also be used for hearing aids/jewellery/loose change).
- A small pack of Baby wipes/ individual face cloth.
 - A Comb.

Working with A&E staff, all these items were identified as being helpful during a stay in A&E care areas and following admission to a ward. These plastic zip-lock bags (approx. 8 x 7 in) also have space for the patient's name and provide immediate access to small but essential items that make things easier for a patient until they can have personal dignity products brought in.



SI Warrington sourced and assembled the items, and 100 Bags were provided to the A&E Department.

ALL AT A COST OF LESS THAN £70.

SI St HELENS

At a recent meeting of Soroptimist International St Helens, local historian Stephen Wainwright presented the club with a cheque for £1,000 to be passed on to the Alzheimer's Society as part of past president Diane Charnock's charity.

In 2022 Stephen's sister Diane Charnock was elected the President of Soroptimist St Helens and her chosen charity, during her presidential year, was the Alzheimer's Society. The reason for this was that Diane and Stephen's mother Alice Wainwright had passed away in 1991 after developing early-onset Alzheimer's.

When Stephen published the second volume of his Hidden History of St Helens series last year, he promised to donate £1 from the proceeds of the first 1,000 copies that were sold to her chosen charity.

The book sold over 1,000 copies and Stephen's donation boosted the amount raised for the charity to £2000

Stephen was also able to show the members an advance copy of his new book 'The Hidden History of St Helens' Volume 3 which will be published on September 1st.

St Helens Soroptimists have given much support in the past 40 years to the St Helens Refuge, for survivors of domestic abuse. They were therefore interested to hear of the chapter in the forthcoming book about the difficulties brutalised wives experienced in obtaining separation orders from St Helens' courts in the early years of the 20th century. *Contributed by Anne Jones*

Membership and service:

Our year started positively with two new members and the presentation of long service certificates to 4 members – totalling 130 years.

In Bolton a suggestion for a worthwhile project, often reveals that someone is already fulfilling the need so that collecting items and volunteering are the most effective ways of offering service.

Volunteering

At our first meeting, in May, we acknowledged National Day of Volunteering on 8 May, and members shared some of their volunteering experience:

Susan has been a **Brownie leader** for 38 years, as Snowy Owl. She started by reading the Brownies' Aims and Objects, which sounded remarkably like our Soroptimist Aims. The movement is still going strong with 89 million members worldwide, and half a million on the waiting list.

Alwyn then told us about the **Friends of Moss Bank Park**, where she is a volunteer working in the Walled Garden. She referred to the support from SI Bolton over the years. The bulbs planted last year for The Queen's Jubilee are doing well and the Friends have enhanced our bed with three Queen Elizabeth rose bushes.

Sadly, the bulbs were past their best when Jane and Maureen visited with the TOTS Group later in the year. SI Bolton have a long relationship with **Toddlers On Tuesday / TOTS** at the Hope Centre.



The helpers encourage the mothers and preschool children to get involved – they can make as much mess as they like – all paint is washable! The children enjoy story-time, linked to the theme for the week, and singing, which generally includes *Old*



Macdonald and his amazing farm, which recently had a Green Man from the Moon. Jane excelled with a large moon rocket, which even the grandfathers

present were struggling with. She had thoughtfully brought some suitable metallic-looking fruit trays.

One member currently volunteers once a week with **Urban Outreach** to check and sort the food donated at the end of each day by the supermarkets, local bakery etc. Members have helped to prepare and distribute Bolton Lunches during the long summer holiday, to local school children entitled to free school meals. This year around 70,000 packed lunches were prepared and distributed by volunteers.



Backup North West at Bolton Food Festival: Backup North West supports young people ages 16-25; changing lives and futures. It aims to prevent homelessness and increase independent living skills. One of the charity's means of raising money is by operating a mobile coffee and cake service.

Two members of SI Bolton volunteered to do a shift on the coffee van at the Bolton Food Festival over the August Bank Holiday weekend. The photo shows new member, Tracey on the left. The Food Festival is now the largest in the country. Despite the inclement weather for much of the weekend, it was well attended and enjoyed.



Jigsaw – improving the world piece by piece. We were challenged to knit 100 **Trauma Teddies** to commemorate 100 years of Soroptimism and SI Bolton set about the task and achieved the goal. Teddies were donated to ambulance crews, carers, GP surgeries, hospital departments, care homes and charities. We have carried on knitting the teddies and they are now going abroad.

One of our former members has returned to Seychelles, working with children and we arranged for her niece, Nadirah, who lives in Bolton to take a batch to the Seychelles.



It transpired that Nadirah is a volunteer for **Jigsaw**, working with families in the refugee camps in Lebanon, mainly on their Dignity project to help with period poverty. (Dignity bags cost £35 each).

A friend of SI Bolton, who suffered a stroke at the start of Covid but who can still knit, requested that we supply her with wool, which we were more than happy to do. Since then, we have lost count of the number of teddies and baby blankets we have passed to Nadirah, along with some small craft items for the children.

SI SOUTHPORT – SEPTEMBER 2023

In early July, with the long summer holiday approaching, one of our new members Jill Newsham came up with a novel and creative project to help local school children discover and develop their love of art.

With the current economic situation in the UK, many families are under significant financial pressure and would not have disposable income to spend on art materials. Jill, as a member of the Arts Society of Southport, suggested the creation of 'Art Packs' – collecting art materials, packaging them and passing them onto the charity Compassion Acts for distribution at local food banks.

SI Southport members were keen to help, so on a sunny day in July, members of the Arts Society and SI Southport members met in Baverstock House to create 50 Art Packs.



As an additional incentive for the children, the pack included a competition, where they could complete their artwork and send it in for judging. The completed packs were passed to Compassion Acts to distribute to families attending their food pantries.

This was a truly collaborative project, conceived and executed in just a couple of months, with a relatively low cost but (hopefully) a big impact for those children who were able to use the material to demonstrate their capabilities.


