SI Bolton continue to support a children's playgroup located in a deprived area of the town. Pre-school age children attend with a parent or grandparent and are encouraged to engage in play and creative activities. At Christmas two hampers were provided by SI Bolton. The contents, aimed at all family members, were donated by club members.

In January the TOTS group enquired whether we would be able to assist with the purchase of an activities table for the children. This was unanimously approved, and the photo shows the table set up for play. The height of the table is adjustable and the middle setting is perfect for two-year-olds. The rim is aimed at keeping the contents on the table, however having seen it in use a couple of times, the children like to pick up the contents and drop them on the floor! They are encouraged to help with the clearing up at the end.





SI Bolton Jigsaw Project

SI Bolton continue their support for this project which helps Syrian refugees in camps in Lebanon. A friend of our club, Kath, is an avid knitter, something she is still able to do after suffering a stroke. We provide her with the wool, and she happily creates trauma teddies and cot blankets. These are among some of the items that Nadirah from Jigsaw takes with her on regular visits to Lebanon. Unfortunately visits to the Lebanese camps have not been possible recently due to the situation in the Middle East.

When we started taking photos of the handover of items this attracted interest from a nearby table. Maureen explained what was happening and a lady offered to donate some spare wool she had. Arrangements were made for this to be dropped off at the café.

Thanks to your support and kind donations, alongside a lot of

hard work from our partners and local team, 2023 saw an incredible year for helping to alleviate period poverty and provide health checks for hundreds of refugee women and girls in some of the neediest areas in Lebanon. This could not have been done without your support and we would like to thank each and every one of you for helping us to create a healthier world piece by piece.

The Club hold a series of coffee mornings over the course of a year. They are generally held monthly in members' homes if there is no other social event in the calendar.

The opportunity is taken to add some money to the Charity Account and a different charity is nominated each year to receive funds.

Bra Collection

In June 2023, SI Widnes commenced a project to collect new or unwanted bras in order to support the charity 'Against Breast Cancer' (ABC). For every tonne of bras collected, the Charity receives £700 enabling the funding of life saving research projects at some of the UK's most respected academic establishments leading to improved outcomes for women throughout the world. Every £1 raised enables the charity to continue their work in finding a vaccine against breast cancer and to look at ways to increase the survival of women and men who have the disease. The bras are prevented from going to landfill and are sent to small businesses in developing countries in Africa and around the world. The bras are given a new lease of life in countries such as Ghana and Kenya where bras are expensive to produce locally, and this provides an income for struggling families.

Being able to access reasonably priced bras, boosts the self-esteem of women and girls in developing countries but more importantly, it can give status to women and girls; and a girl who is wearing a bra is less likely to be raped or, sexually assaulted. With support from local businesses and churches, SI Widnes has placed bra recycling bins in sports and community centres, churches, the local Masonic Hall, Tesco and Halton Haven Hospice. Bra donations are collected from the recycling bins, collated and despatched to the charity 'Against Breast Cancer' by SI Widnes. In October this year, SI Widnes sent the first shipment of 611 bras to the Charity. SI Widnes are continuing to raise awareness locally of such a worthy cause and bra collection is ongoing.
