I know many of you like me have been supporting local sewing groups with scrubs, laundry bags, headbands and masks. As an NHS worker, I know how much these small gifts have been appreciated. However, those of you who do not feel up to the challenge of new technology or do not own a sewing machine, please do not feel that you have not contributed. By staying at home and conforming with the lockdown, you have given the greatest gift you can to your family, friends and the NHS, by not spreading this disease. I know this has not been an easy time for many of you living alone, but I hope that being part of this organisation has given you a little contact with the outside world.

I have participated in two meetings with Federation President Isobel, regional Presidents and countrywide Presidents from around our federation. This is a positive from this pandemic, as these meetings would not normally take place. We are all able to share what is happening in our areas. At the last meeting we heard from the Caribbean President and from South Africa, where members are concentrating on ensuring everyone has access to food and particularly water.

SI BROMSGROVE & REDDITCH

Our club decided to Twin our Tap with another Tap in the World through Toilet Twinning. £60.00 would provide hygiene promotion and training in vulnerable communities across more than 45 countries. This is to help people understand how to protect themselves from Covid-19 through hand washing and good hygiene. Our tap is twinned with a Tippy Tap in Guatemala. The Tippy Tap consists of an old plastic container with a hollow handle, three sticks and some string. A hole is made in the handle so that when the bottle is tipped the water trickles out. A piece of soap is threaded onto a piece of string and then tied to the same stick as the bottle so that the soap is just in the right place for hand washing. We all need to work together to reduce and remove the spread of Covid-19.





Several of our members have been making NHS laundry bags and headbands which go to Hospitals, Care Homes, GP's and anywhere else they are needed. The laundry Bags are used to put the Care Workers uniform into when they leave their work. They can safely take them home and put the whole bag into the washing machine, thereby minimising the spread of germs, virus and disease. The headbands are used to hold the face masks in place, because their constant use was causing sore areas behind the ears. The masks can now loop onto the buttons placed on the head band. To date, two members have made a total of 64 laundry bags and 100 headbands. Well done to them!

Bromsgrove and Redditch Soroptimists have made or collected up "Thank You Cards" for the Charity 'Hope at Home'. The Charity supports survivors of Slavery and Trafficking by housing them in private homes until they are confident, settled and able to find accommodation of their own. 'Hope at Home' was one of the speakers at our recent Slavery and Trafficking Awareness Day held last October in Bromsgrove. Over sixty Cards were handed over to the Charity to help them in their work. Hope at Home's Helen Hodgson thanked the Soroptimists very much for their support.

Programme Action
BAG-PACKING AT TESCO

On Friday 6 December a group of five members went Tesco Ricoh Arena to bag pack. This was our first venture doing this and any money raised was going to our charity, Health Help International. The staff and customers were very friendly and helpful, and were interested both in our charity and in Soroptimists. People were generous and often contributed even if they preferred to pack for themselves. We finished at 12.45 pm. The five members who volunteered managed to raise £122.32 for our efforts. We look forward to doing this again, hopefully with more volunteers.

FUND-RAISING SUCCESSES

At the end of the year we donated £53.75 to the Federation Benevolent Fund; this amount was collected in 5-penny pieces at every meeting during the year.

We also sent £1000 to Health Help International, our charity for the year. This, together with the £500 sent in August, has made a substantial contribution to the facilities at Thanal House, where destitute women with mental health issues are cared for. The earlier sum was used to connect the septic tank to

the new toilet block, which enabled completion of the toilet-block project.

CLOTHES FOR AFRICA AND INDIA

At least two members are still busy during lockdown with knitting needles and sewing machines, making clothes for girls and babies in Africa and India.

We celebrated International Day at our meeting in November. Candles were lit for our Friendship Link Clubs. She told us about some of the places she has visited, and the work she does with schoolchildren wherever she goes.

GLOBAL CARE

In January we welcomed Carolyn, who is a volunteer from Global Care, a local Coventry charity focussing on children. It is a Christian-based charity active in 17 countries in 4 continents and its commitment is to reach the 'poorest of the poor'. This includes children stigmatised by disability, street children, those affected by HIV / Aids, children from persecuted ethnicities. The charity works through grass-root organisations and local people; this enables them to make links to local resources as well as to support the groups to become self-sustaining. Education is proioritised and other related projects have developed, such as adult literacy. Carolyn spoke with passion, and her motto resonated with us all: "Can't do everything, mustn't do nothing, can do something"

COVENTRY NIGHT SHELTER

In February, Simon Brake gave us a very illuminating talk on Coventry Winter Night Shelter, a voluntary organisation run by religious communities around the city providing shelter for rough sleepers during the winter months of December to March. The organisation provides 20 beds per night, rotated between seven centres, and enables guests to have a warm bed, hot food, friendship, and support over the winter months. There is also help to find and move into housing, e.g. help with obtaining identity documents, access to mobile phones, deposits and first month's rents on housing. Guests are also offered clothing, shoes, and other necessities and are signposted to appropriate services. The project is multi-faith and assists over 60 adults each year, all of whom have been assessed to ensure all guests are safe, with drug, alcohol abuse and disruptive behaviour not tolerated. It was very humbling to hear of the work and dedication of these volunteers, giving up their time to help those who are so marginalised and vulnerable. especially as the Night Shelters are open every night during the winter including weekends and holidays. KAIROS

Michelle Hughes was our speaker in March. She is the acting Chief Executive Officer at a Coventry charity: Kairos Women Working Together. Kairos was set up in 1999 by a small group of volunteers to reach out to women caught up in sexual exploitation and street prostitution. The founders recognised that these women were marginalised and vulnerable, finding it difficult to access services such as health care. Michelle explained some of the factors that affect the women that Kairos works with and reasons for them being vulnerable to sexual exploitation. Many have experienced child abuse, been in Local Authority Care, have mental health difficulties, are homeless, misuse alcohol and/or drugs. Kairos provides women with personalised, non-judgemental services, including outreach work, drop-in sessions, one-to-one and group support, criminal justice and prison visiting to help women through the criminal justice system. A prevention service works to support young women who are at risk of sexual exploitation. Their latest project is a partnership with Coventry Haven, providing women only safe housing. One of the most important aspects of the work is keeping promises; Kairos always fulfils the promises it makes to its clients - very important to women who have been failed many times by other organisations. A collection amongst our members raised £90.50 for the charity.





SI HEREFORD

We, in Hereford would like to wish everyone health and safety in this really worrying time. Who would have thought that things could have come to such a standstill so quickly virtually throughout the world? We all sympathize with everyone who has had losses during this period and reiterate the enormous thanks to all the front line workers who are trying so very hard to maintain their professional roles throughout this pandemic.

Club has managed to maintain seven members to carry on in 2020/21, one of whom is in hospital and has been very poorly but she is making steady progress. Rosemary, Violette Szabo Museum Curator, had been busy organizing a celebratory event at the Museum in July but has had to postpone until next year. Although this has created much extra work, she has now completed her changes and able to rest again. It is disappointing that we lost four members last year as they were all good friends, but it was mostly due to their family commitments that they were no longer able to continue.

We were unable to meet for an AGM but carried this out via email and snail mail, thus enabling us to plan for the time we can meet together as a club. Last year was a very good year for us as we had seemed to have quite a few activities which raised us some money, so grateful thanks to all members for their generosity.

Unfortunately, we - as all others - have been unable to meet up but we have not been idle. Anne and I have been sewing away. Anne has made 10 scrub bags via 'For the Love of Scrubs' and 30 masks, 20 gowns and is awaiting 6 sets of scrubs to sew. I have done 10 scrub bags and 12 masks. My scrub bags went to Hereford Hospital - for which we had a grateful reply from Lucy Flanagan, Director of Nursing, who was really most appreciative (they also had leaflets of our Organisation so that we could use it as an advertising opportunity too.) The masks have been handed to friends and family. Anne is a really good member and we cherish her busy participation.

This week I was really excited to receive a card from Federation President Isobel and Regional President Rose, congratulating me on 25 years as a Soroptimist Member. At first I was unaware of the dates and on checking through my personal archives soon realized why I had received it. I can honestly say that during these years I have met so many super ladies and what a joy it is to work with an Organisation that has the same true values.

I have also enjoyed many happy hours in Wales South and Midland Arden. It is true to say that wherever you are you will always be happy in Soroptimist company. Sadly, I am not as switched on as I used to be, mainly because I am not able to spend so much time with a keyboard - but I have a go and try.

Let's all hope for a safe and healthy year and make some more monies for our charities. We look forward to seeing you all at the Regional Meetings.



Bring abusers to justice. Could include expert support attending court, help writing statements and giving evidence, emotional support and more.

As always Soroptimists respond to needs in the community! Late in April, a request came for Scrub bags for NHS healthcare workers to put their soiled clothing into at the end of their shift and put them straight in the washing machine. Three members got creative and the first 160 bags were distributed to NHS staff at Heartlands Hospital, Good Hope hospital and the Nightingale hospital at the NEC.

May – At the club's second virtual meeting, President Margaret inducted two new members, Angela Ladds and



Fiona Brown, introduced by Pauline Mackie and Ann Keepax. We also welcomed Ann Hill and Pat Kirby transferred from Central Birmingham. Great to see Val Mansell is a link member now living in Devon.

As always, members are mindful of those in need during the Covid-19 lockdown. Following the meeting, generous donations came in, which were divided between ANAWIM Drop In, Birmingham & Solihull Refuge and Helping Hands Food Bank. Thornton Chocolate goody bags were also delivered to 30+ staff at Elizabeth House Care Home to let them know that we are thinking about them.

Finally Scrubs and yet more Scrub bags... A total of 442 bags were collected this week so a chance to catch up in their gardens. One member has been sewing Scrub gowns, 120 already delivered with 80 more to go!

Just before the COVID-19 lockdown, President Anne Rogers brought her year to a conclusion with a visit accompanied by Mary Tooley and Linda Saunders to a Nepalese reception in West Bromwich in recognition of our SIGBI project 'Empowering Girls in Nepal. It was an enjoyable evening with Nepalese music, dancing and food. The Deputy Nepalese Ambassador was presented with a framed certificate of one of our 'Twinned Toilets' in Nepal.





President Anne's year culminated in a very successful International Women's Day Afternoon Tea at Jonathan's in The Park, Bearwood, in aid of Mary Stevens Hospice, Stourbridge, our local charity. Regional President Rose and several Soroptimists from around the region joined us. Music and poetry to theme, and an auction and raffle entertained the company. The profit of £400 was doubled by our charity account to make a £800 donation to the hospice, which has just received an 'Outstanding' CQC assessment following an unannounced inspection in February.

So lockdown arrived, and we have kept in touch with a WhatsApp group as well as by email and 'phone calls, Facebook, and Twitter. Jan McConville leads WhatsApp with a relentless supply of amusing videos. Our AGM was completed by email, and May Business led by President Rachel Tennant, saw us on Zoom, with which we had become quite familiar by the time of our second Book Club, currently taking the place of our Dinner meetings this spring/early summer.





We currently have three definite entrants to 'The Big Story' - fundraising for the girls in Nepal. Other Programme Action has seen the Club donate £300 to the Black Country Food Bank, and individual members have similarly donated both to this and a local Stourbridge community hub arrangement. Vice President Jane Clarke has liaised with our Women's Refuge, and arranged purchases of requested items, such as food and games - the children needing constructive occupation at this time.

We have responded to UKPAC and our partner Toilet Twinning, with whom we are working towards

Toilet Twinned Town status, who are currently purchasing water taps to further improve hand-washing hygiene in these COVID times. We have purchased 6 taps at £60 each from donated dinner monies not spent in April. Working with our Friendship Link SI Wrekin, we have to date individually purchased 28 virtual balloons for an eco-race on 2nd June in aid of the British Red Cross and their appeal for COVID crisis resources.

The current situation has given us all even more appreciation of the increasing challenges women and girls face during lockdown. It has spurred us on to consider additional ways Soroptimists may be of support in improving the lives of women and girls, by encouraging more partnership working with members' various charitable links and learning. Our Vice President Jane Clarke has shared her Kerala Partnership report with us, most impact is felt by those least able to withstand a challenge, as at home. Nearer to home, our local Mary Stevens Hospice is particularly grateful for donations when fundraising by Trading and Events dries up. Telephone helplines are needed as much as ever, with different questions arising as women in particular face increasing demands upon them.



Our two Book Club meetings on Zoom, have so far discussed Bernadine Evaristo's Man Booker joint winner 'Girl, Woman, Other' and, led by President Elect Linda Sanders, Kellie Rubenhold's The Five (Social history of the women killed by Jack the Ripper). As it was #MentalHealthAwareness week, we all wore green and our 'Think On It' badges to Zoom. During #MentalHealthAwarenessWeek, we also held a silent auction by WhatsApp and email in aid of our local Dudley Mind organisation. Lots of good quality items donated – jewellery, perfume, toiletries, a knitted wrap, a cross stitch canvas etc. The final figure was £400+. Well done Ladies!



SI WORCESTER

Our last contribution to the Regional "News and Views" publication was in January 2020 where Clubs were able to share information, fun and friendship as we looked forward to planning our programmes for 2020/21.

Nevertheless, as Soroptimists we have taken up the challenges the pandemic has caused, become flexible in our ways of working and are making inroads into continuing to meet the various demands of supporting the UN's Strategic Development Goals and contributing to the Education, Enabling and Empowerment of women and girls locally, regionally and (inter)-nationally.

Club meetings continued, despite the significant flooding of the Severn in our area making travel extremely precarious, until lockdown in March.

Following an afternoon "Reflection" meeting in January, utilised to exchange views on how to manage the Club flexibly and the pragmatic use of Member's skills and willingness to contribute, we achieved a consensus for 2020/21. The first outside educational meeting, also in mid-January, led by the Economic Empowerment & Environmental Sustainability Group, saw a mixed group of Soroptimists, Wribbenhall WI members and their guests together with a couple from the Wyre Forest Friendship group attend ENVIROSORT in Norton, Worcester to learn more about recycling in our Region.

Envirosort is a Materials Recycling Centre (MRC) and the plant receives, sorts and dispatches all the clean recyclables collected by the refuse operatives from households across Worcestershire and Herefordshire. That is, all the cans, bottles (glass and plastic) paper and light card put out for the kerbside collections. Essentially the bin lorries transport the collected "green bin" material to the Norton facility where it is emptied directly onto a conveyor belt assembly. The employment of a systematic range of techniques allows for the waste to be sorted into categories. For example, metal cans/containers are 'magnetically' 'captured'; items made from glass are broken into smaller sizes thus allowing them to "fall off" the conveyor belt into strategically placed hoppers beneath the conveyor belt. Finally, the workforce, suitably attired in PPE, then hand remove any residual "contaminants" before the sorted waste is then made into bails and stored. A range of contractors are employed to transport the sorted waste to companies to manufacture a range of downstream products. Any "nonrecyclable" waste is streamed to a local energy recoverer, leaving around 5-10% going to landfill. This latter figure is improving monthly. We came away having observed the working of this facility with an improved knowledge of what can be recycled as well as the chemistry of the term "plastics" and how this impacts the energy recycling processes. - A coffee morning together with sales of a selection of "FreeTrade" goods and a raffle raised in excess of £130.
- Sales of home-made jams and marmalades over the year added another £224 to allow the
 purchase of both much needed toilets as well as improved hygiene by provided "taps" essential
 during the current pandemic.
- Pat has also collected coins to the tune of £ 20 for Water Aid.

During early March before 'lockdown' we held our annual Quiz to raise funds to continue our support of a young disadvantaged girl in Uganda as she completes her course of education via FOAG.

Our Group Leader, Pat Martin organised and led the "virtual" AGM conducted via email in April. Over the past 10 weeks we have kept in touch with all members by email mainly and the telephone. This also applies to our Friendship links who have responded with warm wishes. As part of our continuing efforts to support needy women/girls and local charities we have:

- clapped for the care workers on a Thursday
- donated our monies that would have paid for our 'supper' had we been allowed to meet for our normal "Speaker meeting". These monies have been donated to Worcester Foodbank to enable foodstuffs to be purchased for families in need. This approach will continue until we are able to resume meeting.
- Support was also provided to the local Charity Whatever Makes
 You Different makes You Beautiful in lieu of a cancelled event Club
 had planned to raise funds and to ensure their work would continue
 through this current pandemic.
- Members celebrated VE Day in a variety of ways, taking into account the "social distancing" and other rules applied to prevent the spread of the coronavirus. In the best traditions of SI, members were photographed sitting in their gardens having tea (or something 'bubbly) - doing what Soroptimists do best, helping where necessary.
