WORKING WITH OUR LOCAL COMMUNITY:

As well as raising money for local charities which provide support for women and girls, and families where appropriate, we provide a service across a range of activities in the town:

Port Talbot has a population of approximately 38,000 with one in four people being defined as living on, or below, the poverty level. In the upper Afan Valley that ratio would be higher. As a club, we are very much aware of this and support, both financially and through service, those organisations that work with families, the homeless (young and adult) to help improve their situation.

We also work with other charities, such as Thrive, Dewis, Rotary, Bethel Trust, so that we can support women and girls and, where necessary, support men and boys.

Organisations worked with include:

THRIVE:



We have an on-going project to support Thrive, a shelter for women fleeing from domestic abuse... on arrival at the refuge the ladies are given a Welcome Box of essential personal hygiene products – imagine arriving in a place, scared for your life, having nothing familiar around you and being given a box of products which some may see as luxury due to their abuse in their own home, this is such a difference for these ladies and may help make a difference to that one women's wellbeing and start of her road to recovery

Dewis:



Dewis is a registered charity and limited company with a track record of over 30 years delivery of services to support young people – together with partners, supporters and fundraisers, they help young people to live safely and independently.

At Dewis the mission is to alleviate homelessness by providing specialist support to young people, especially those with complex needs, who are homeless or at risk of being homeless, aiming to improve their current circumstances and build resilience for the future.

Bethel Trust:



SI Port Talbot are regular supporters and funders of Bethel Trust, a registered Charity, Bethel Trust exists to alleviate poverty and help our community in practical ways, working with people of all backgrounds without discrimination which aligns with the programme focus of Soroptimism.





Baby Basics at St Marys Church:



Club members continue to support St. Mary's Church baby bank ...and they encourage friends and family to get involved. Club has several talented "knitters & crocheters" who have been busy crafting babywear and blankets; also donated baby clothes and baby items are also collected and delivered by a club member.

We have arranged a weekly support group meeting at a local library to offer support and advice which three of our members co-ordinate and in addition to this regular coffee morning a special event was arranged to acknowledge the Ukrainian Independence Day

WORKING WITH LOCAL SCHOOLS:

STEM Cymru Support



The work done by the STEM Charity fits perfectly with helping girls fulfil their potential and it fits with our vision and is helping educate, enable and empower girls into a "men's world". They run " Girls into STEM" a programme of events which aims to encourage female pupils to take an active interest into STEM (science, technology, engineering & technology) subjects prior to their GCSE subject choices One of the Trustees of the Charity, Robert, visited club and gave a talk to members and handed out literature about the STEM organisation and answered club members questions about the programme . It was very informative and encouraging to hear of the uptake by girls locally to take an active interest in STEM subjects. We gifted £500 to STEM Cymru from Charity Funds . We will keep in touch and hopefully take the project further



Thailand - Student Visit Support



In continuation of the initiative started during the previous year, and part of SIPT's ongoing relationship with the Afan College, we have provided financial support to four of their girl students to participate in an organised group visit to Chaing Mai, Thailand so enabling their participation because of economic pressure they could not go without such funding; the Upper Afan Valley where they reside is one of the most economically deprived areas of the UK The trip provided an invaluable International experience Empowering, Enabling and Educating four young ladies from deprived backgrounds, two of whom classified as having Additional Learning Needs.

This trip was to be particularly invaluable to those students as it is not somewhere they have ever thought achievable. Four girls have been immensely benefitted. SIPT helped to Educate, Enable and Empower these four girls, and if SIPT had not assisted with funding the trip to Thailand, the girls might have opted out of academics in order to generate income for their families. The experience broadened horizons as well as enhancing by self- education, and it also helped educate local girls with English and other skills.

Wellbeing Dog School Visiting:





Well-being dog Lottie the cavachon (and her Soroptimist owner!) visits a local Primary School library weekly and works with ALN pupils and interacts with pupils following a reading intervention programme. The aim is to help educate each pupil to improve their reading skills while the relationship between the dog and pupil enhances the learning through comfort and security.

Lottie's owner Club member Jean, herself a retired head teacher, visits the school library weekly with Lottie and works with ALN pupils and looks after pupils for two hours each Friday.

SIGBI Activity and Involvement:

16 Days of Activism Orange the World:



An Orange Cafe was set up in the Costa Coffee Shop in Port Talbot town centre. Tables were reserved and SI Port Talbot club members dressed in orange. Posters were made and put up in the cafe to promote 'Orange the World' 16 Days of Activism' from 25th November - 10th December to support Stopping Violence Against Women and Girls. Orange badges were purchased and given to people in the cafe.

Lend with Care:



We started donating to Lend with Care some years ago. As loans are repaid, we reinvest this money to help women to improve their standard of living, thereby enhancing their family and children's and community's way of life.

To date we have made **12 loans** we have helped **168** lady entrepreneurs to date, **402** family members helped, **11** jobs created and **581** people helped.
