

Dame Vera Baird – the Victims' Commissioner instigated an observation project to look into the effectiveness of DV courts. Clubs nationwide are attending Magistrate court hearings and submitting their findings for a report to be published later in 2022.

SI Winchester is working with SI Solent East locally on this.

Club members have written to their MPS con tinuously and addressed the House of Lords by writing to the peers requesting they support the amendments to the Domestic Abuse Bill – such as coercion and non-fatal strangulation.



### Transforming Lives Together Conference 2017

At the Conference at the University of Winchester on Saturday 4 March, as part of the lead in to International Women's Day, women from across Hampshire, Wiltshire, Dorset and Surrey gathered at the University of Winchester heard how the lives of women and girls are being transformed locally, nationally and internationally.

The event was opened by University Vice-Chancellor Professor Joy Carter, who told delegates how the University's precursor institution was established to train teachers to teach the poor and that Winchester was the location of the first school for poor girls, in the building that is now The Bell public house in Cross Road.

Both Southampton, and Winchester SI Clubs have raised funds for solar lamps, and in the summer of 2021 held a successful fund-raising Garden Tea, which we are planning again during the 1<sup>st</sup> weekend in August (Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> with a sequel Tea on Sunday 7<sup>th</sup>).

The lamps enable young people to study in areas of the world where there is an absence of electricity. We support two programmes : Solar Aid working in Malawi, and the Little Sun Foundation working in Rwanda and Ethiopia.

These lamps support education, health, the environment and family economy in these countries where 90% have no access to electricity and use expensive Kerosene for cooking and light, causing chest problems, accidents and environmental pollution.



### International Solar Projects – 2018 ongoing

We recently had a talk from Solar Aid, one of the solar projects we support. The impact of a solar light on the lives of those in poor developing countries without electricity is beyond compare.

Light gives access to evening activities – education, medicinal, working and above all improves the lives of those accessing it. There are several schemes and to access a solar light and in buying it rather than being given it, the light has a value and is looked after.

Solar Aid works in Malawi and Uganda. We also support the Little Sun Foundation which works in similar ways. Their products differ slightly in design from those of Solar Aid.
