## Yorkshire Celebrates...

President Liz has hosted two Regional events during May and June: the Regional Conference on Saturday 14 May and the 80th Anniversary Afternoon Tea on Sunday 26 June.



The theme of the Regional Conference was "The World We are Making ". Margaret Emsley, President of SIGBI (pictured above) was the first speaker. Margaret spoke about her career , both professionally and in Soroptimism, and the importance of engineering, science and technology in today's world and the future. Mary Creagh, MP, then challenged us with three huge global issues: conflict., inequality and partnership. Mary also talked about the Sustainable Development Goals. Keith Clarkson, from the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds was the last speaker in the morning. Keith had some lovely slides, showing classes of birds, which were declining because of modern pressures and those that were increasing because of the same changes. The morning concluded with an "Any Questions " session, when each of the three speakers responded to

range of questions from the floor, arising from the earlier presentations and on environmental matters.

The afternoon sessions showcased practical projects involving recycling and upcycling and also using reclaimed materials to reconnect people to nature. The final speaker then spoke about today's challenges facing the children in her school. And concluded with selection of songs about the sea, performed by a Soroptimister.

Closing the Conference, President Liz asked all Clubs to bring any environmental projects that they were working on to the Regional Council Meeting in September

The Afternoon Tea to celebrate 80 years of Soroptimism in Yorkshire opened with President Liz and Thelma de Leeuw, Honorary Member of Yorkshire, cutting the cake made by President Liz accompanied by the assembled company, some

120 Yorkshire members, singing "Happy Birthday" Afternoon Tea was served at the table and comprised a selection of sandwiches, scones with jam and cream, a variety of cakes and lots of tea or coffee.



Entertainment followed the form of a talk about the Scandalous Women Hazlewood Castle and then "The Yorkshire Curd Tarts" a musical group, who sang a number of songs about Soroptimism, all written by Elizabeth Hughes , and concluding with "Eating", when everyone joined in the chorus. Margaret Cook, Honorary Member of Yorkshire, gave a vote of thanks to all involved in the very enjoyable Afternoon Tea.

# June Update

#### **Z**imlink

There's good news and bad news. First the bad news: the economic situation has deteriorated further and the country has completely run out of US\$ (the economy runs informally on US\$ since the Zimbabwe dollar collapsed). Banks are restricting withdrawals and days go by when no money is available at all. A new bond note may soon be introduced whose value will be on a par with the US\$ but this will have no value beyond Zimbabwe's borders, so most businesses say they will not accept them. In addition the harvests have failed so food will have to be imported and cannot therefore be paid for with these new bond notes.

The SODA home for destitute

elderly near Harare is a Soroptimist project which illustrates the problems suffered by all their projects. Fundraising is near impossible with no cash available and the staff, who are on tiny wages anyway, have been put on half pay. Providing food for the residents has always been an ongoing problem for the club members but it has reached crisis point. Their aim is to help SODA develop income generating projects - market gardening, chicken rearing etc. which will alleviate the food shortage too.

Which brings us to the good news. A friend of a club member has sent a gift of \$900 from Canada which means that the market gardening and chicken rearing can be set up. In addition, because electricity charges are exorbitant, solar lamps and gas freezers can be purchased which in turn means that any food produced can be frozen and stored.

The tale of woe is repeated across every Soroptimist project in Zimbabwe, but it also shows how a cash injection would be used by our sister Soroptimists to make a massive difference. Of course at the moment, sterling is not buying many US\$ but we must not let that prevent us from redoubling our efforts to send what we can.
